Pastor's Report to the Congregation

To Timothy, my loyal child in the faith: Grace, mercy, and peace from God the Father and Christ Jesus our Lord.

—1 Timothy 1:2

Grace, mercy and peace...if one were to ask what our deliverables might be in the church, these three would be a great place to start. In this Annual Report you will find evidence of these three throughout. I encourage you to read the report and discover all that God has been up to through all of us at SOTP.

Pastor's Report to the Congregation (cont)

Just a reminder....

Grace is the unearned gifts God gives. The Lord relates to us only by grace, and so should we in our relationships with others. God's grace provided salvation though we do not deserve it. (Eph. 2:8). God's grace blesses us with the riches of heaven. God's grace brings us peace in troublesome times. God's grace brings us good things every day (1 Tim. 1:14).

Mercy is God withholding what we deserve because of our sinfulness. The consequences of our sin is death, yet Jesus paid the price for us (Rom. 6:23). God is merciful, slow to anger and abounding in steadfast love *and so should we in our care for others*.

Peace is the state of mind and heart we experience when we are confident of God's grace and mercy toward us. Peace comes in knowing that God's grace will sustain us, even in our most difficult crises (Phil. 4:7). God assures us that even when we fail in our commitments to Him, God will show mercy upon us, and so should we show mercy. This blessed assurance gives us peace.

The peace God gives is different from the peace the world offers (John 14:27). The world seeks to sedate us from the problems we face through counseling or drugs or temporary pleasures. The peace God gives goes right to the soul, relieving the heart and mind.

How are you praying for those close to you? In your family, family of friends and your church family, for what are you praying. There could be no better request than asking the Lord to give an abundance of grace, mercy, and peace.

"The Lord God has given me the tongue of a teacher, that I may know how to sustain the weary with a word."

Isaiah 50:4

The above verse from the prophet Isaiah is a heavy load to carry—for anyone! But this is what teachers are called to do—not only to teach, to impart knowledge, to be open to questions, but to lift up, to build up, to sustain. Hopefully that has been done during this past year.

2021 began the way 2020 ended: with the absence of in-person classes. In their place, we taped sessions which could be viewed on-line. When we renewed in-person learning in September, we continued recording each week which allows us to reach more people with our weekly Bible studies.

We began the year by exploring the variety of metaphors the biblical writers have used for God: potter, rock or fortress, servant, mother, warrior, and host. Then, during Lent, we looked at the variety of laments found in the Psalms: individual, community, laments of revenge (not nice but in the Bible!), as well as the hymns of lament in our worship book. We concluded with God's own laments (that's in the Bible too!) We shifted gears during the Easter season, going from Lenten laments to psalms and hymns of praise (an appropriate theme for Easter), again reading individual songs of praise, those of the community, as well as biblical stories of praise.

September brought with it the opportunity to meet in-person once again! So, our Sunday and Wednesday classes resumed, although the numbers in each were a bit lower than in previous years. We began with a study of Paul's letter to the Ephesians, emphasizing that the Gospel, the Good News, includes the church. Following that, we did an introduction to the Gospel according to Luke, our primary gospel for 2022.

I'm so grateful for all those who've either attended our classes this fall or who have been joining us online for almost two years now. Thank you! And I can't begin to express my deep appreciation for the partnership of Mike Yndestad who brings his amazing recording skills to the task week after week.

HR Committee Annual Report

After being re-established in mid-2020, the HR Committee completed its first full-year cycle in 2021.

An overview of 2021 accomplishments includes:

- A review of 2020 employee performance was conducted as well as goal setting for the 2021 year. The HR Team is taking an iterative approach to these processes, going from very little structure to more robust versions year over year.
- Employee files were audited, brought up to compliant levels and moved to an electronic record-keeping system.
- Several key positions were successfully filled including a new Operations Manager, Little Lambs Assistant and Youth Intern.
- A comprehensive review of the Employee Handbook was conducted, and a new version published with a January 1, 2022 effective date. This document will provide important governance to SOTP employees as we continue to grow.
- Employees benefits were reviewed, and amendments were made primarily to paid time off to provide market-competitive offerings where SOTP is able.
- Employees were provided communications confirming their position specifics including expected work schedule, hours, legal status, and other specifics which were previously unclear. This will help greatly with budgeting alignment.
- An annual HR calendar was established to guide process timing throughout the year.

Each of these efforts is not meant to be a one-time event but an on-going review and adaption of employee related policies, procedures, and cultural alignment to best serve the vision and mission of the church and its resources as we grow.

Attracting and retaining the best talent for SOTP is the goal of the HR Committee and we look forward to supporting the church in this endeavor in the coming year.

YOUTH AND FAMILY MINISTRY TEAM ANNUAL REPORT 2021

The Youth and Family Ministry Team continues to plan, execute and lead activities, events and ministry activities for students in $6^{th} - 12^{th}$ grades.

Confirmation Program:

SOTP had 14 students participate in their Affirmation of Baptism ceremony, held this year on Oct 31 (Reformation Sunday) during the 10:45 service. Each student attended our 'Who Am I?' event on Oct 2nd where they were introduced to the Faith Statement writing process by several leaders who shared their own Faith Stories as well as opportunities for some fun using Team Building activities throughout the evening. These students then finished writing their Faith Statements throughout the month of October prior to Confirmation Sunday. Our Youth Team Leaders are extremely impressed with the Faith Statements written this year.

In Sept, we began our Confirmation Program with $40.6^{th}-8^{th}$ grade students registered. We meet Wednesday nights from 6:30-8:00 with everyone gathering in the Fellowship Hall for an activity and large group lesson. Students then break into their small groups and spend ~ 30 minutes reviewing the lesson and building relationships with their leader and students within their group. The fall session has focused on Old Testament lessons and we look forward to exploring the New Testament and Luther's Catechism during the spring session.

Special thanks to our Large Group Leader Tim Torkelson and Small Group Leaders Carrie McCabe, Ron Mudge, Josh Harding, Jason Brown, Seth McCulloch, Kara Burg, Grace Boster, Marissa Rojas and Jeffry DeLong for their dedication and commitment to our confirmands.

High School Youth Group:

The HS Youth Group meets on Thursday nights from 7PM – 9PM where we spend time building relationships, participate in group activities and have a lesson led by our intern, Becca Colson. Becca attends Judson University and will lead our Thursday night group through the spring session. We are extremely excited to average double digit attendees on a regular basis. We encourage any students in 9-12th grades to reach out with any questions, or join us any time.



The Youth and Family Team is extremely grateful to Kurtis Arndt who served as an intern from the fall of 2020 thru June 2021, leading our youth group and planning & leading our 2021 Mission Trip. His dedication and leadership were a welcome addition to our team throughout his internship.

2021 Highlights:

- SIMPLICITY MISSION TRIP: 13 HS students and 4 chaperones left June 13 for a week in Cedar Lake, IN serving others in the Valparaiso area. The students and chaperones served at a Food Pantry, completed home repairs, bonded together as they cleared debris and then completed the 3 Dunes Challenge at Indiana Dunes National Park. These students had daily devotionals, conducted evening worship for the group, learned a lot about themselves and each other throughout the week
- HS Youth and volunteers hosted a Bag & Bingo Event on June 5th to raise funds for our Mission Trip. Many members of the church enjoyed an afternoon of Bags competition and playing Bingo.
- Feed My Starving Children Service Event: 30 volunteers packed almost 13,000 meals for children around the world on March 30th.
- Green Trees: 7 students and 2 chaperones helped clear debris and shrubs on Oct 17 at Green Trees

We look forward to 2021 and our continued work to help make Christ known to the youth of SOTP.

- Finance Policy Review
 - Our Treasurer, Accounting Administrator, and myself have begun to review and improve the Finance Policy
- Open Door Policy
 - O I have made it a point to encourage relationship building by keeping my door open for anyone who may want to talk while I am here at the church

Finance Team

The Finance Team is responsible for overseeing the daily, monthly, and year-end financial activities of the Church. Our 2021 Team members were Devin Burg, John Throckmorton, Bill Nesta, Cliff Dungey, Melanie Chesney (Accounting Administrator), Sue Wehnes and Bob Mollis (Finance Chair/Congregation Treasurer).

Your Finance Team monitors all financial activities and meets monthly to review the Church's financial reports. We report monthly to the Church Council with our analysis of the Church's financial position as well as any financial recommendations we think appropriate. We are responsible for the preparation of the annual budget and the monitoring of our actual financial activities against that budget. Financial policy and procedure recommendations are submitted to the Church Council for approval to improve cost control and financial processes.

We are also responsible for managing the Church's Mortgage Service fund, maintaining adequate reserves for the maintenance of our building, periodically reviewing the insurance coverage and policies, reviewing contracts for services, being alert to compliance issues, and assisting with an audit of the Church's accounting records.

In 2021, total General Fund Member Contributions increased by \$19,986 compared to 2020. COVID-19 continued to restrict public worship, which in turn affected both our attendance and contributions. The total General Fund contributions were \$767,562 compared to a budget projection of \$781,370. This income short fall was offset by Council and Ministry staff controlling expenses. The 2021 General Fund expenses were \$763,257 against a proposed 2021 General Fund budget of \$781,370. This leaves a positive year to date balance of \$4,305 in the General Fund to carry forward to 2022.

You will find our 2021 financial reports and 2022 budget enclosed elsewhere in this annual report.

Other specific financial team accomplishments during 2021 included: Tracking, recording, and obtaining final forgiveness of the Payroll Protection Program through the Federal Governments SBA. Renegotiating the office copy machine equipment lease. Updating the online electronic giving process and procedures. Creating a staff/vendor ACH payment and Petty Cash policy and procedure. Creating and managing two new restricted funds around construction of a new Storage Garage and the construction and long-term maintenance of the Memory Garden Columbarium. Creation of an interest-bearing account for the restricted SOTP Endowment fund.

Please join the Finance team in thanking Linda Dungey for her dedication, service, and knowledge in her role as the Financial Contribution Secretary. Linda volunteers her time to record all members estimate of giving records and donations. She also generates the members quarterly giving statements and annual giving reports. Please reach out to Linda and thank her for her dedication and service.

Connections Ministry

What a year this has been; but the Connections Ministry has been working to continue to connect and engage people into the life of Shepherd of the Prairie.

GRIEF MINISTRY & JOURNEY GROUP

Our Grief Ministry sends books to help those who are mourning a loved one. They receive four books over the course of the first year. This year we have sent the series of books to about 30 people, some of whom are not members of the church.



We have continued our Grief Journey Group this year and is has been heartwarming to see people connect with others who are grieving to offer and receive comfort, support and insight. Our group meets every Tuesday night from 6 to 7pm in the Library and all who grieve are welcome. We have been joined this year by many who are not members of SOTP. Several funeral homes and hospice organizations recommend people to contact us for the grief group. Our group decided to meet on Tuesday mornings during the winter starting in January 2022.

Another part of our grief ministry is our Blue Christmas service held in December. In 2021, it was held on Dec 7th. While we didn't have a large in person congregation, there were many more who worshipped on line and even more who viewed it on Facebook after that evening. Many of those who worshipped with us whether on line or in person let us know how meaningful the service was to them.

Barnabas Caregiving Ministry



Our Barnabas Caregiving Ministry was able to begin making visits to hospitals, care facilities and homes again as the year moved on. Our ministers have been faithful with phone calls and in person visits where possible. Each person on our Barnabas Care List received 2 cards each month. The Barnabas program also collected tablets that have been wiped clean by a member of SOTP who also added the website to them.

SMALL GROUPS 78

Working with Pastor Mark on the objective to make discipleship an integral part of the culture and DNA of Shepherd of the Prairie, we began a process of rethinking and re-visualizing our existing groups. We began with the idea that "small groups are the heartbeat of SOTP". To that end we recognized that all ministry done in and through SOTP is done through small groups. Small groups have five characteristics; study, fellowship, support, service and discipleship. All of our ministries here at SOTP strive to encompass all five of these characteristics. The ministries were categorized as to which characteristic they focused on; study, fellowship, support and service. We acknowledge and stress that each group involves all of the characteristics including discipleship.

While all of the groups include discipleship (learning from Jesus to live life his way), we wanted to include groups that intentionally focus on discipleship. To accomplish that, we introduced the **7s** Discipleship Groups. These are groups that meet each week for seven weeks in the fall, winter (post-Christmas) and spring (post-Easter). They include, as they meet, the elements of study (a Bible study and worship), fellowship (time for fun and/or snacks), support (listening to and praying for each other), service (finding a project to participate in), and discipleship (apprenticing themselves to Jesus to learn how he lived and how they can too).

We enlisted seven leaders for our first discipleship groups who were trained through SOTP and an online program through the United Methodist Church. We began our first session of **7s** with a celebration of our existing groups and a kickoff for the **7s** on October 10th. The groups then met for 6 more weeks. Most of the groups are gearing up for our next kickoff of our winter session on January 16th, and two more new groups are beginning with new leaders. The spring session with kickoff on April 24th.

Connections Ministry (cont)

New Member Gatherings And Visitor Awareness

Four New Member Gatherings were held during 2021; March, May, August and November and we welcomed 49 new members; including our first virtual members. Many of our newest members have already become actively engaged in the life of SOTP! Welcome to our all of new members and we look forward to getting to know you better!

We continue with our Visitor Contact link on our website enabling visitors to connect with us by filling out virtual "Welcome Center" information. Many people from all over the country have connected with us in this way. It's a beautiful thing to have people from all over our country and the world worshipping God through SOTP. We have also revamped our "in person" Welcome Center program.

Northern Illinois Synod

This year I served on two Northern Illinois Synod Committees; The Nominating Committee as chairperson and on the Ministry Support Committee and was elected to a six-year term on the Consultation Committee. Due to both the Congregational Resourcing Event and the Synod Assembly being cancelled, I helped to prepare and lead an online forum for Anti-Sexual Harassment Awareness Training. I also serve on the Bishop's Advisory Cabinet and the governing board for NIS Diakonia program.

MINISTRY TEAMS

As you read through the ministry reports for this year you will see how our SOTP Ministry Teams have continued to serve God, all of you and our communities. Our Ministry teams have been active in working to engage all of us in ways to do kingdom work.

Life continues to be challenging during these days, but as we return to normalcy here at SOTP, we have risen to the occasion to bring God's love to all those we come into contact with. I would like to thank everyone who helped care for God's people whether it was through a ministry here at SOTP, or in your own families or neighborhoods. God has truly blessed us with opportunities to serve God and God's people! If you are looking for a way to become engaged with serving God and God's people, contact me and I will be happy to help you find the right fit.

It has been very gratifying to serve in partnership with God and this congregation as we work together to bring God's kingdom and will "on earth as it is in heaven". Thank you for the opportunity to serve in this capacity!

Children & Family Ministries

The year 2021 was filled with many joys and new beginnings for the Children & Family Ministry, as well as its own challenges in many ways. With COVID still being a concern for many, the year started off slow as the world awaited more people to have access to a vaccine, but we did not let that stop us from creating opportunities for community and beginning new ministry programs for our kids and their families! Our ministry knew that we were embarking on a new journey in this new world we are currently living in, and we took the initial steps in adapting when necessary and creating spaces for the spirit to move amongst us and our families here at Shepherd of the Prairie.

We continued to have virtual Sunday School for the Spring semester, but this allowed our team to imagine and prepare a new model for Sunday School beginning in the Fall! We were able to, once again, hold inperson programming on Sunday mornings for our students in September, and it went off with a bang! We renamed our Sunday Program to "Kids Connect", and went from a classroom model to a Children's Church model. We knew our kids had had enough school in their life, and we wanted to create an environment for them to not only learn about God and the Bible, but we wanted them to experience God in unique ways and change what that learning could look like! Each week, the kids were still able to participate in worship in a multi-generational way, as well as have their own version of a message that could reach their level of understanding. Our kids start off in service to worship through music and prayer with their families, they then leave to go receive their message, activity, and learning only to return back to service during the passing of the peace so they can be a part of our wonderful sacrament of communion and witness God moving in the whole church in this way. It has been so great to see so many kids each week come and experience God in this new way and see how the Holy Spirit is moving in their lives. Each week we do something different and make the message interactive for our students. Some weeks we do a science experiment, other weeks we watch videos and have fruitful discussions, and some weeks we play an interactive game that we can draw our main message from. From week to week, it looks different and it keeps our kids excited to come back for more!

We were also able to have in-person events this year, and it came with its own excitements and unknowns. We mostly wanted to provide spaces for our families and church members to gather again and have fun together in different ways. We never knew how many people were going to show up or who would show up, but we knew no matter what, that we still wanted to create these opportunities, and see how the Lord would use them to connect us once again to each other in person. We had our first ever Kite Day in the spring that brought people together from the church and the community! We even had a wonderful gentleman donate his amazing handmade kites that he thought we would enjoy for our kite day! We were also able to host a fun Summer Evening movie night outdoors which brought together many families from our community and all-over. Along with that, we were able to host Vacation Bible School outdoors this year at the end of the summer. Our expectations were exceeded as we had so much fun with a jam-packed week of dancing, singing, learning, and more! We did not let the heat keep us down, and we pushed through as we celebrated Vacation Bible School together. In the fall, we were able to have Trunk or Treat once again, and we could not have asked for a better day! We are gearing up for another year full of events and fun times, and we cannot wait to see how the Lord will use this ministry in this way this next year!

Along with that, we were even able to celebrate a new program that began in the fall. This new program is called "Adventure Club" and it is geared towards our 4th and 5th

grade students. This program was modeled after confirmation in its large group, small group format, and it is another unique opportunity for our older kids to feel like they have a place where they can have community together and learn at a level that suits them specifically. We decided to run this program in a 7-week trimester model allowing students to join when they can and have breaks in between. We go for 7 weeks in the fall, 7 weeks in the winter, and 7 weeks in the spring. This past fall we learned all about who God is, and it was so joyful to be able to witness God's hands in these students' lives. We laughed together, challenged each other, prayed together, and learned more about what it looks like to have a relationship with Jesus. I look forward to seeing how God will move amongst these students as we start up again in January for our next session!

As you can see, even though the year started off a little slow, we were able to hit the ground running and have another successful year celebrating our Lord, joining in community, and being God's hands and feet amongst each other. The planning for 2022 has already begun and been mapped out, and I cannot wait to see how the Lord uses this ministry in the new year!
