A Note From Pastor Mark

Dear Christian Friends,

Blessings to us all as we journey through Lent together. I am hopeful that you will take this time for reflection and action as God leads you in your walk of faith.

This month I am going to use my newsletter article to introduce a ministry program recently adopted by your Congregation Council and led by our Inreach team at Shepherd of the Prairie. Pastor Don Larson wrote the manual for lay people who are trained and commissioned for this ministry. He shares a family story, one that illustrates what this ministry is all about:

"Sunday dinner was a special meal in the Larson home. On most Sundays the entire Larson family was at the table. But Don's father sometimes worked at a local gas station on Sundays. On those days 'Mother would fix a plate for him following the family's dinner, cover it with aluminum foil, and carefully slip it into a sack, along with tableware and a napkin.' Don would take it to his father. His father could have carried his lunch like he did every other day of the week, but that wouldn't have been the same. By bringing dinner from the family table Don's father connected with his family on their special day."

MINISTRY OF COMMUNION FROM THE ASSEMBLY is meant to provide a church family connection with those who are home-bound, in hospitals, nursing homes or other clinical settings. It is a ministry approved a number of years ago by the ELCA. This ministry brings the Lord's Supper from the worshipping congregation, thus making a connection with those who are unable to participate in the worship experience.

Our goal is to commission our ministers in worship on Sunday, June 2. On that day Shepherd of the Prairie will begin providing a ministry that has been a blessing to many of God's children in the ELCA.

If you have any questions related to this ministry please don't hesitate to contact me. Also, please feel free to talk with Pastor Ken Pohlmann, who will be training our ministers or Donna Kelly, Inreach Team Leader.

Thanks be to God for all who lead and serve through our community of faith.

THE BRAND OF SELF

The term "branding" has snuck its way into the way we talk and live in recent years. Kids now aspire to be "branded" because they know that wearing the right brand assures them of the status they so desperately desire. What does it mean to be "branded"? It simply means a brand label and style is adopted as one's personal identity. Kids who don't wear the right clothes can become the object of peer taunting and exclusion at all grade levels, from nursery school right on through college and into their adult years. Some parents are going so far as to hire professional shopping consultants to do back to school shopping with their kids. One of those consultants says she knows how to convince a mother that paying \$160 for a pair of jeans is worth it because "your daughter is going to get so much confidence from them." Parents, our kids are learning that what you wear is an important determiner of status. But is that who God calls us to be? Is that where God wants us to find our value? No, our worth must be found in Christ alone.

Quick Stats

90% of tanning salons claimed that indoor tanning wasn't dangerous at all, while more than half said that tanning beds would not increase the risk of skin cancer. (U.S. House of Representatives Committee on Energy and Commerce Investigative Report, 2012) Compared to children who were never bullied, bullying victims are 3 times as likely to have suicidal thoughts, and those who were bullied over a long period of time were 6 times more likely to consider suicide. (Journal of the American Academy of Child and Adolescent Psychiatry.)

Prescription Drug Abuse

Nobody wants their child to become a drug or alcohol addict. In fact, most parents work hard to keep their kids from substance abuse and all the dangers it brings. We applaud ourselves when our kids choose not to abuse alcohol or other drugs like meth, heroin, or marijuana. But have you thought lately about the trend

towards the abuse of prescription drugs? The abuse of stuff that can be found in the family medicine cabinet has been on the rise for years. Nearly one in five teens admits to abusing medications that are not prescribed to him or her.

Experts advise you to look for these signs of prescription drug abuse: a change in sleep habits, a change in energy level, a change in personal hygiene, a change in mood or personality, a sudden change in grades, a change in their circle of friends, the loss of appetite, and constricted eye-pupils. Parents, monitor your teenagers and their friends. Your commitment to keeping them off drugs will protect them from hurting themselves in long-lasting ways.

Latest Research

Cruelty and Kindness Online

A new survey from the Pew Research Center reveals some interesting information regarding what online life is like for our children and teens. According to Pew, two-thirds of the teenagers surveyed said that people are mostly kind to each other on social networks, even though 88% said they had witnessed people being mean or cruel to others.

> One in five teens admits to joining in on the cruelty. In relation to online bullying, one in four teens said that an online squabble had gone offline, resulting in a face to face argument or worse. In an effort to protect our kids and to teach them how to live online to the glory of God, we

must take the time to monitor their online time and then step in, offering guidance, correction, and boundaries where needed. The good news from Pew is that 86% of teens say that their parents had advised them on how to use the Internet responsibly and safely. The SOTP Easter Offering will be divided among three organizations that bring the Easter message of hope to our neighbors in need.

McHenry County Jail Detainee Ministry Program: Faith leaders, including Dan Driscoll-Shaw, bring counseling and Bible study to those detainees waiting to learn their future.

Buddy House/LSSI Prison Family Ministry: Located in Blackhawk Courts, Rockford, IL, this Lutheran Social Services of Illinois program provides after-school activities, tutoring and snacks for children. Adults find it a quiet place of respite where they receive support, access community resources and receive information about their incarcerated loved ones.

FirstSteps Press: A new program of Exodus World Service, FirstSteps Press publishes information that refugees need to begin rebuilding their lives in their new home in the United States. The information is translated into key refugee languages and includes photos of real-life situations. SOTP's offering to FirstSteps Press will help Exodus World Service develop these critical resources and get them into the hands of the refugee families and the volunteers who need them.

STEWARDSHIP TALES

A man decided to get rid of a dog he owned. When he drove to the city he stopped near the outskirts, put his pet out and drove away. He spent the rest of the afternoon and evening in the city.

Later that night, through the chill of the falling snow, he headed home. As he neared the edge of the city he saw his dog sitting just where he had left him. As the car approached, the dog lifted his ears, stood up, and wagged his tail. The man drove on past.

At home he confessed to his wife that his conscience was hurting him; yet he did nothing about it.

This story is a realistic illustration of spiritual errors made by God's children when they hope that someone else will assume their responsibility. The man had hope that someone else would take the dog and look after it. Christians often think, "Oh, someone else will do it.

Christian Stewardship is a message and a mission that is learned by a lifetime of practice. Children, as well as adults, need to learn the lesson of sharing with God some of the good things He provides for them. The work of Christ is not something that someone else funds. It is an effort we all need to support, it's everyone's responsibility.

GIVING STATEMENTS

Thank you to all of you who have worked with me in the process of getting the giving statements emailed to your homes. I have struggled with the new software, but with the help of Dennis & Renae, we have made a lot of progress and it is working well for us. I am excited to share with you the statistics on cost savings. In 2012, we had over 350 boxes of envelopes issued (that number for 2013 has already been exceeded). Of that number, we have thirty members (less than 10%) who do not have email addresses. We also have about ten members who prefer a printed copy (3%). This is a tremendous saving of printing, paper and envelopes. We save postage when you pick up your statement at church, but statements not picked up are mailed. Considering the increase in postage, wear and tear on our copy machine, and time it takes to fold and stuff envelopes, I am very excited about saving time, money and using less paper.
