A Note From Pastor Mark

Dear Christian Friends,

Romans 8

Paul's letter to the Romans, written to a people he had not visited but longed to know personally, brings to his readers his very deepest beliefs. It speaks to the mind in strong theology and to the heart of living in Christ. What a joy to reach a crowning point in verses 26-39 of chapter 8. For in these verses, those who have put their trust in God through Christ Jesus find assurance upon assurance of God's love for us and presence in our lives.

For those times when we face a situation where we feel our deepest need for God but can't find the words to pray, Paul assures us that we don't have to verbalize that need for the Holy Spirit prays for us. Furthermore, the Spirit's prayers on our behalf are prayers from the heart of God!

Paul goes on to emphasize that all things work together for good for those who love God. Have you looked back on something that seemed a great disappointment at the time and realized that in fact it was a blessing in your life? God doesn't send suffering to help us grow, but God can use the sufferings and disillusionments that come to us in this life to give us greater insight or compassion and thereby draw us closer. Perhaps something that we might have wanted and seen as absolutely necessary would have been the very worst thing for us.

Then Paul shares with the Romans and with us his complete confidence in the fact that nothing can separate us from the love of God through Christ Jesus. Paul, who had lived through shipwreck, beatings and prison still considered himself more than conqueror. We can't read these words without feeling Paul's joy in his relationship with Jesus.

I had the graced experience of sharing the last months, weeks and days with one whose complete trust was in God even through that time of suffering from life threatening illness. Yes, there were those days when she couldn't find the words to pray, but she knew that when she opened herself to the Holy Spirit, God would hear. Although succeeding diagnoses were more and more difficult to bear, she continued to hang on to God's promises. And then when death was near, she put her hand in the hand of Jesus. The illness did not separate her from God's love!

What a blessing to know that our destination is secured. I pray that you may feel each day the mighty hand of God leading and guiding you on right pathways for his names sake knowing "nothing will separate you from the love of God in Christ Jesus."

SUMMARY: The New Member and Involvement Coordinator will be charged with promoting, encouraging and coordinating new and existing members within the congregation to hear God's call to serve in ministry. This position will welcome and facilitate the discovery and use of new member's God-given talents and skills. The New Member Welcome and Involvement Coordinator will support active and ongoing ministries in support of the mission of the church while also providing strong leadership for volunteers involved in leading ministries.

ESSENTIAL DUTIES AND RESPONSIBILITIES include the following. Other duties may be assigned as needed.

Primary Responsibilities

I. Organize and along with Pastoral staff, lead new member gatherings.

2. Formulate a plan with the Pastor to grow the base of support for member involvement in meaningful ministry and assess new talents and skills toward that objective.

3. Help facilitate connections between new members and ministry leaders within the congregation through use of digital database of talents and skills.

4. Work closely with the Pastor and SOTP Inreach Team to further develop new ideas and special projects to continue to grow vital ministry in support of the mission of the church while continually assessing the ongoing involvement of new members.

5. Serve as a resource and guide for ministry leaders, assisting them in understanding skills and talents as well as encouraging a team approach to ministry.

- 6. Maintain current job description notebook as a guide for volunteer ministry leaders
- 7. Develop and implement a recognition program for ministries.

8. Keep thorough and accurate records and provide feedback to and from Pastor and Church Council.

9. Uphold the mission and values of Shepherd of the Prairie.

FROM THE WORD:

We will develop Christ-like character that enables us to be about Christ's work in the world without being of the world. We will understand the importance of the church and our role in it. And, we will ask God to instill in ourselves a Christian way of looking at and living in all areas of life.

Does that sound like a tall and imposing order? It is! In effect, parenting children and teens is about becoming a Christian educator. And, when it comes to the spiritual nurture of our kids, the most powerful and lasting lessons aren't forced, but they flow naturally out of who we are. To nurture your kids you must first be nurturing yourself. Helping them to know God flows from our own knowledge of God. What are you doing to know and embrace God?

TRENDS pornography use

In his little book, What's Wrong With a Little Porn When You're Single?, Nicholas Black reminds us that it's easy to fall into the trap of thinking that looking at porn isn't at all harmful. After all, everyone else is doing it. Sex is natural. And, we can lead ourselves into thinking that it's something we can keep under control. But pornography is the

misuse of God's good gift of sexuality, making it a sin against God and others. Nicholas also says that pornography negatively impacts the life of a single person in three ways, all of

which we should share with our kids. First, pornography isolates you from healthy dating relationships by creating unrealistic expectations for other people. Second, pornography sabotages your future marital relationship before you are married, by destroying your ability to experience spiritual, emotional, and physical intimacy. And finally, pornography can lead to sexual addiction. Equip your kids for a porn-free adolescence

Latest Research Post-Christian Nation

The folks at the Barna Group continue to track spirituality and Christian commitment in contemporary north American culture. Not surprisingly, Barna has found that we are, indeed, becoming a nation populated by post-Christian people. Nearly two-fifths of the nation's adult population can be considered post-Christian based on an aggregate measure of fifteen different factors that measure identity,

> belief, and behavior. What is most telling for those of us who are parents, is that there are striking differences between the generations, with each generation

measuring as more post- Christian than the prior generation. Forty-eight percent of this generation of children and teens qualify as post-Christian. While we may bemoan this fact, it should cause us to become more intent on engaging in deliberate efforts to nurture our children in the Christian faith. We encourage you to take Deuteronomy 6 to heart, and talk all the time about who God is and what He's done.

Teenagers who have best friends that drink are three times as likely to begin drinking themselves. (Research from the University of Iowa)

Adult Education

Lazy, hazy summer days are upon us, vacation time is here, let's slow down and relax a bit! But this doesn't mean we won't continue meeting and studying God's good and faithful Word together. Of course, we will! So what's on the calendar for the month of July?

On Sunday, July 7; Tuesday, July 9; and Wednesday, July 10-we'll explore the assigned Old Testament reading for the 7th Sunday after Pentecost, Isaiah 66:10-14, a text filled with great promise for a downtrodden people. On Sunday, July 14; Tuesday, July 16; and Wednesday, July 17--we'll plumb the depths of Deuteronomy 30:9-14, the Old Testament reading for the 8th Sunday after Pentecost, and another text full of promise for a people learning to live in a new way.

Then, during the last two weeks in July, something a bit different happens. On **Sunday, July 21**, we'll study Genesis 18:1-10a, the story of God's promise to Abraham; and on **Sunday, July 28**, Genesis 18:20-32, a wrestling match between God and Abraham.

On **Tuesday, July 23 and on Wednesday, July 24; and again on Tuesday, July 30, and on Wednesday, July 31, PASTOR MARK** will lead us on a journey of reflection based on the Gospel reading and his sermon from the previous Sunday. This is a great opportunity to sit at the feet of our pastor, and to deepen our understanding of the Word that went forth in the power of the Spirit.
