A Note From Pastor Mark

Dear Christian Friends.

I believe that Psalm 23 is the most read chapter in the Bible.

Is it any wonder that this little piece of Scripture has captured the attention of so many hearts? It paints a vivid picture if we take the time to absorb what is being described. It begins with words of assurance to the believer gently coupled with words of peace and quiet to instill a feeling of spiritual renewal. Thus assured, we are given guidance to honor not only the Lord's name but also we are provided with protection in our journey through life, our approaching death and the life thereafter.

In Luke 17:22-31, Lazarus, a beggar, appears in heaven and a rich unrepentant man having also died found himself on the other side of the chasm which prevented him from entering heaven and enjoying the comfort that Lazarus had. So while Lazarus and other believers are being fed at the banquet table, the rich man and his co-residents must be content to simply watch while the wonderful aroma titillates their noses.

Five Trends Your kids Think are Normal... But Shouldn't:

When you're born into something, you don't notice it. It's normal. It's always been there. You know nothing different. You don't question it. You accept it. And when someone comes along who does question it. . . well. . . that rattles your world and you think the questioner is nuts. That's certainly the way it is with the youth culture soup kids are swimming in today. There's stuff in there that wasn't around when those of us who are older were adolescents. But it's always been there for our kids.

With your kids back in school, start thinking now about how you will take time during the coming school year to teach your kids some important lessons by intentionally addressing, talking about, and pounding home (over and over and over again) God's will and way on these five trends that have become just a normal part of life for your kids.

- I. **Social Media Narcissism**. Hey, there's nothing wrong with Facebook, Twitter, and other social media platforms. But when these sites are used to create, curate, promote, and sell one's self. . . that's narcissism. It's idolatry. We need to teach our kids how to use social media to the glory of God, not self.
- 2. **Relativism**. We live in a world where kids are encouraged to develop, figure out, and act on the truth that works for them based on how they feel at any given moment in time. If it works for you, well then go for it. Fact is, that's a recipe for personal, communal, and societal disaster. Let them know that God has gifted us with His will and way. There is such a thing as transcendent truth that exists outside of ourselves and that always has been and always will be there.
- 3. **Cohabitation**. Marriage is in deep, deep trouble. The days of "first comes love, then comes marriage, then comes baby in the baby carriage" are long gone. Even our Christian kids are opting to get it all out of order. Teach a biblical order for love, sex, and marriage through your words and actions. Chances are they aren't hearing it anywhere else.
- 4. **Tolerance**. I will be the first to admit that we need a little more appreciation for the great diversity that God has placed in His world. In addition, we need to show a whole lot more love and grace to those who might think and act differently. The church hasn't done a good job of that in recent years. But now, the pendulum is swinging in the opposite direction. When tolerance runs amok we wind up promoting, celebrating, serving, and spreading the kingdom of the world, the flesh and the devil (i.e. sin) . . . not the Kingdom of God.
- 5. Marketing and Consumerism. Each of us sees multiple thousands of marketing messages a day. Talk about swimming in something so much that we don't notice it anymore! Each of those ads sells both product and a way of looking at/living life. I believe that in today's world, marketing shapes us more than anything else. Ads promise redemption, wholeness, and satisfaction through the purchase of a product. But we know those products can never deliver the redemption we need. Why then, do we buy into their messages and manipulation? Teach your kids to think critically and Christianly about ads. Go ahead now. . . rattle your kids. . . even if they think you're nuts!

Lingerie for young girls

It wasn't that long ago that a young girl passing from childhood to puberty would mark the start of that passage with a trip to the store with mom to purchase what was called a training bra. A recent story from Bloomberg Businessweek sheds light on just how much our culture has changed. It seems that sales of lingerie for younger women are a 1.5 billion dollar a year business for the folks who manage Victoria Secrets' line of products known as Pink. The lingerie line known as Pink is geared primarily towards college girls. But VICTORIA'S SECRET because of age-aspiration and the desire to look and feel older, more and more middle school and younger aged girls are tapping into the brand. Consultant Dan Stanek says that young girls are getting the message that sensuality and body image are tied together, thereby driving them to grow up and be cool at younger and younger ages. Parents, we need to temper this pressure with lessons that point to finding one's identity in Christ, and dressing to His glory.

LATEST RESEARCH

Parental influence & drinking

Maybe you remember that now famous still picture captured from the movie Animal House. In the photo, John Belushi's character is seen wearing a sweatshirt emblazoned with the generic word "college," while he's holding a bottle of whiskey. The pic-

ture captures what many college students believe is an integral part of their college experience. Sadly, many parents think the same thing and wind up believing that there's nothing they can do to

prevent their son or daughter from getting wrapped up in the campus drinking culture. But new research from The Journal of Alcohol and Drugs shows that teens who talked with their parents about anti-drinking strategies before beginning their first year of college were more likely to fall into a non-drinking or light-drinking category, or to transition out of the heavy-drinking category if they were already heavy drinkers. Parents, your influence is more powerful than you think, and you must equip your kids to make Godhonoring decisions.

QUICK STATS

73% of 9 and 10 year-olds and 80% of 13 and 14 year-olds have been identified by their teachers as being adversely affected by sleep deprivation. (Boston College)

Teens who watched movies featuring lots of on-screen drinking were twice as likely to start drinking as compared to those who saw much less on-screen drinking. Those teens were also 63% more likely to progress to binge drinking. (British Medical Journal Open)

SUMMARY: The New Member and Involvement Coordinator will be charged with promoting, encouraging and coordinating new and existing members within the congregation to hear God's call to serve in ministry. This position will welcome and facilitate the discovery and use of new member's God-given talents and skills. The New Member Welcome and Involvement Coordinator will support active and ongoing ministries in support of the mission of the church while also providing strong leadership for volunteers involved in leading ministries.

ESSENTIAL DUTIES AND RESPONSIBILITIES include the following. Other duties may be assigned as needed.

Primary Responsibilities

- I. Organize and along with Pastoral staff, lead new member gatherings.
- 2. Formulate a plan with the Pastor to grow the base of support for member involvement in meaningful ministry and assess new talents and skills toward that objective.
- 3. Help facilitate connections between new members and ministry leaders within the congregation through use of digital database of talents and skills.
- 4. Work closely with the Pastor and SOTP Inreach Team to further develop new ideas and special projects to continue to grow vital ministry in support of the mission of the church while continually assessing the ongoing involvement of new members.
- 5. Serve as a resource and guide for ministry leaders, assisting them in understanding skills and talents as well as encouraging a team approach to ministry.
- 6. Maintain current job description notebook as a guide for volunteer ministry leaders
- 7. Develop and implement a recognition program for ministries.
- 8. Keep thorough and accurate records and provide feedback to and from Pastor and Church Council.
- 9. Uphold the mission and values of Shepherd of the Prairie.

ALTAR GUILD

THIS TIME I'M NOT ASKING, I'M BEGGING!!!

The ALTAR GUILD currently has about 30 ladies/men who do the setup and take-down for communion at three worship services each week and ALL our special services throughout the year. Thirty members is a very small percentage of our adult membership to take care of one of the most important jobs for our worship services — preparing the Eucharist. Working in teams it requires 15 minutes before and after each worship service. Early service members are scheduled for one month at a time with an alternate in case of illness or time away. The late service teams prefer one Sunday per month. Saturday services we have several leaders and other volunteers.
