YOUTH CULTURE NEWS

Identity Matters

Ever wonder what occupies the minds of your teenagers more than just about anything else? It's the quest to figure out who they are and who they will be for the rest of their lives. Developmental experts call this primary task of adolescence "identity formation." It's this quest for identity that leads so many of them to regularly reinvent and curate themselves visually and descriptively on social media sites like Facebook, Twitter, and Instagram. To complicate matters, they've been hammered long before their teenage years by a non-stop flow of compelling messages fed to them by a culture that's more than happy to write their identity script, telling them what to think, what to say, how to live, and who to be.

If our primary calling as parents is to point our kids to Christ, praying that He would embrace them so hard that they would find their identity solely in their embrace of Him, then what can we do to help our kids find their way through youth culture's confusing identity mess? Here are some suggestions to get you started.

First, look in the mirror to evaluate the identity you've chosen. Our example speaks louder than anything else to our kids. In his book The Reason For God, Tim Keller reminds us that "every person must find some way to 'justify their existence,' and to stave off the universal fear that they're a 'bum." Ultimately, our identity can and must be found in Christ and Christ alone. We must be sure that with Augustine we are able to say, "Our hearts our restless until they find their rest (identity) in Thee!"

Second, continually check in on the identity-shaping world of your kids. For the Christian parent, culture-watching is an active and on-going responsibility. The responsibility falls on us to stay on top of the nuances of our kids' youth culture, particularly the messengers and messages that are shaping their identity. But it's not just something we do. It's something we do with a purpose. Theologian John Stott calls this "dual listening." He says that we "stand between the Word and the world with consequent obligation to listen to both. We listen to the Word in order to discover ever more of the riches of Christ. And we listen to the world in order to discover which of Christ's riches are needed most and how to present them in their best light."

Third, confront the lies. Several times in the Sermon on the Mount Jesus issues "You have heard it said. . . . but I tell you" statements. Each and every time, Jesus is issuing a corrective to conventional, widely-held, cultural wisdom that his hearers had not only heard, but had allowed to become a part of their very lives. A hallmark of our parenting is continually assuming the same "you have heard it said. . . . but Jesus tells you" posture on identity matters.

Look for, find, and expose our world's identity lies. . . in the culture, in yourself, and in your kids.

Kids And Smartphones

Have you seen those Youtube videos of babies and toddlers trying to manipulate magazine pages as if they are tablet and smartphone screens? It's not surprising that the youngest digital natives have difficulty differentiating smart screens from paper pages, and they wind up swiping the

pages with their fingers to no avail. One reason for this is that we are putting smartphones in the hands of our youngest kids. We need to start thinking about how

smartphone use is affecting our children. Nineteen percent of our elementary school-aged children are now using smartphones. One of the most prevalent dangers is that smartphones give kids access to the Internet. Sadly, many kids are engaging with smartphones without parental supervision, making it possible for them to seek out or accidently be exposed to dangerous Internet content. We suggest that you think twice before putting a smartphone in the hands of your unsupervised young children.

LATEST RESEARCH

Sports Concussions

With school back in session and the fall school sports season in full swing, it's important to take a minute to think about a health issue related to kids and sports. As parents, we need to be diligent about ensuring the physical safety of our kids and their bodies as it relates to concussions. God made the brain to be a complex organ. In recent

years experts have been sounding the alarm about the short and long-term damage that concussions can do to the brain. A recent study in the journal Pediatrics

suggests that the effects of a concussion may last longer than previously thought, a reality we should consider when we are pondering when to get our kids back on the field. Some concussions take months, rather than a few weeks, to heal. It takes longer if the athlete has had a prior concussion. In a day and age when we value athletics and on-field achievement perhaps too much, think about the long-term effects that today's decisions might have on your kids.

Operation Christmas Child

It's not too early to think about Christmas! Once again, our SOTP youth and children will be leading us in Operation Christmas Child (OCC). Christmas shoe boxes—often the only gift many children will receive—are filled with toys, hygiene items and school supplies, and then sent to children in need around the world. We hope SOTP members of all ages will help us fill LOTS of shoeboxes.

Boxes must be returned here by Sunday, November 3rd. For more details on how to pack a box and the needed tags, etc., please pick up a brochure at our OCC display (starting in early October) or go to operationchristmaschild.com. Shoeboxes should be standard size and be able to be opened for inspection, so if you want to wrap the box, please wrap the lid and bottom separately. Also, OCC requests that you include \$7 for shipping. This can be a check inside the box or donated online with the receipt attached to the box. (Bonus if you donate the shipping online: you'll receive a tracking code to attach to your box so you can follow your box to its destination.)

Individual items and cash donations are also welcome. If you don't want to fill an entire shoebox, we'll have a box in the Crossroads where you can drop off individual items. Our church youth will use these to fill additional boxes at our packing party. Or you can make a cash donation, and our youth will do the shopping for you.

But it's not just about the presents inside the box. Before distributing the boxes, OCC adds a gospel book in the child's native language, so the boxes truly are a way to demonstrate God's love to needy children around the world and to share the Good News of Jesus Christ. And many of the children who receive boxes are invited to participate in a follow-up program where they learn more about Jesus.


Saturday services we have several leaders and other volunteers.

ADULT EDUCATION

What's coming in adult education for the wonderful autumnal month of October? First, on Sunday October 6, at 9:00am and 10:30am; on Tuesday, October 8, at 7:00 pm; and on Wednesday morning, October 9, at 11:00am, we'll explore the office of bishop within our church. Our current Presiding Bishop, Mark Hanson, graced us with his presence this past May and was expected to be re-elected to this office in August. But it didn't happen! Elizabeth Eaton was elected, and following her election, several people asked, "What happened?" And, "Why don't you do a class about bishops?" So, at the beginning of October we'll explore the office of bishop. What is a bishop? Why do we have bishops? Where does this office originate? What does a bishop do? And what difference does having a bishop make to those of us who sit in the pew? Good questions, all. So come and find out just what this "bishop business" is all about!

Then, for the remained of October, we'll begin to explore the Gospel according to St. Matthew. Why Matthew? In part because we Lutherans (along with our friends in the Roman Catholic, Presbyterian, Methodist, and Episcopal churches) we'll hear the story of lesus through Matthew's words this next year. We are currently hearing from the Gospel of Luke each week, last year we heard from Mark, and now it's Matthew's turn. What's unique about Matthew? What are the things for which we need to listen? How does Matthew compare with the other gospels? Starting on Sunday, October 13, at both 9:00am and 10:30am, and continuing each Tuesday evening at 7:00pm, and on Wednesday mornings at 11:00am. we'll open Matthew's story. Of all the gospels, Matthew has the most lewish flavor, and yet, right from the start, he sneaks in Jesus' openness to the Gentiles, the non-Jews. Of all the gospels. Matthew is the best organized--he likes grouping things together. And, of all the gospels, Matthew has the most challenging things to say about the church. So, come and join us, as together we put ourselves under God's good Word, and open ourselves us to its power.

BOOK CHATTERS

Book Chatters will kick off the year **October 16** at 1:00 p.m. when we meet at the church. Gail Barnard will be reviewing Little Boy Lost as the content for the first meeting. During the session, we will choose our books for the next several months and will enjoy the usual spirited discussion of the book.



Chatters meet monthly to discuss our book of choice -- we keep it light most of the time but have been known to wander afield into side discussions that delve deeply into topics suggested by the book. Monthly, we choose the book for the coming month so that participants have the opportunity to get and read the book. Once in a while, someone shows up and admits they didn't get the book or didn't get it finished. No shock, no problem. We just clue them in and let the discussion go on. We have read classics, top-ten listers and a variety of other titles. We usually don't get all wonky about literary structure or illusions, but aren't immune from mentioning things we like and don't like. In other words, we're a group of folks who sit down around a good book we got from the library, bookstore, or e-book and have at a lively discussion.
