A Note From Pastor Mark

Dear Christian Friends,

Those Generous Macedonians...

When God gave the Promised Land to the Israelites, God told them what was expected of them regarding the poor who would be among them. The Israelites were to be openhanded to their needs. In the same way, we are to be openhanded with all that God has given us.

In The Joyful Christian, C.S. Lewis gives a good definition of what being openhanded means. He writes, "I do not believe one can settle on how much we ought to give. I am afraid the only safe rule is to give more than we can spare. In other words, if our expenditure on comforts, luxuries, amusements, etc. is up to the standard common to those with the same income as our own, we are probably giving too little. If our charities do not at all pinch or hamper us, I should say they are too small. There ought to be things we would like to do but cannot do because our charitable expenditure excludes them" (pg. 144).

In 2 Corinthians 8:1-7, Paul sheds an even greater light on giving. The very act of giving generously is a gift from God. He cites the example of the Macedonians who insisted on the privilege of giving even from their poverty. He goes on to encourage the Corinthians to follow in their stead. It is interesting to note that these Christians had wealth, but had not yet considered generous giving as an outlet of their faith. Not only

does Paul give them the example of the Macedonians but reminds them of the gift Jesus gave us—leaving his heavenly home to live as a man in our world. We are reminded of the letter to the Philippians where Paul says that Jesus, having the very nature of God, did not consider exploiting that position but instead took the nature of a servant, taking the form of a man and being obedient to death, even death on the cross.

I would encourage and challenge us in our giving. Be encouraged by the great faith shown by our sister and brother in Macedonia long ago. What is our response to giving to those in need? Do we give openhandedly, or do we find excuses for not giving?

When given examples of others who are giving generously, do we respond in kind, or find reasons why we cannot? When reminded of all that Jesus gave on our behalf, can we do otherwise than give ourselves and all that we have to him in return? May our prayerful response be— "We give Thee but Thine own, whate'er the gift may be; all that we have is Thine alone, a trust, O Lord, from Thee."

Thanks for your faithful giving and serving through Shepherd of the Prairie. I am so blessed to serve among you.

From The Word...

Growing up in today's youth culture means that our kids live their lives on a landscape filled with all kinds of pressures and choices. One of the most important lessons we can teach them is that whenever they make a

choice, they are choosing sides. They either choose the narrow road that leads to life as they make their choice intent on bringing glory to the Kingdom of God, or they choose the wide road that brings glory to what the Bible calls the kingdoms of the world, the flesh, and the devil.

Counselor Timothy Lane reminds us that the world, the flesh, and the devil are three basic elements to temptation. The world includes our

past, our strengths and weaknesses, and our relationships. These things don't determine our behavior, but are our "bents" that lead us to respond and choose in certain ways. The flesh is our evil desires. And the devil is the one who uses the world and the flesh to set traps that lead us into sin. . . and then accuses us of being so rotten and evil when we do sin that we stand no chance before God.

But John reminds us that while we are to remain watchful because of the world, the flesh, and the devil, God has provided a way out. The Spirit tells us, "The one who is in you is greater than the one who is in the world" (James 4:4). That's a message that we must embrace ourselves, and never stop teaching our kids.

<u>Trends</u> Exercise Dependency

Over the last several years, CPYU has researched the eating disorders known as anorexia nervosa and bulimia nervosa on numerous occasions. While doing that research, we learned that there are all other kinds of disordered eating starting to

sweep through our culture. We live in a world where the pressure to be thin and to be perfect are overwhelming. One surprising disorder is

labeled hyper-gymnasia. It's an obsession with and addiction to exercise. It's now more commonly called exercise dependency. A recent study of 2,800 secondary school children found that as many as 8.5% showed some degree of exercise dependency. While this behavior spans both genders, it tends to be young women who most often show signs of becoming obsessed with a gym perfect physique and then exercise as much and as often as possible. In a world where identity is found in appearance, we need to lead our kids to find their identity in Christ.

Latest Research Sexual Assault

Earlier this fall, the United Nations released some alarming news regarding rape and sexual assault against girls under the age of eighteen. New research indicates that one in ten girls around the world have been forced to have intercourse or take part in other sexual acts. This

means that there are about one-hundred-and-twenty million girls who have been victimized, most commonly by former husbands, boyfriends, and partners. What is

it that feeds this horrible scourge of sexual misconduct? First, the sin that has entered into and permeates the world has broken God's good gift of our sexuality. And second, we live in a culture that continues to promote boundary free sexual expression and the objectification of people, which combines to send the message that people are not people, but sexual objects to be used. Parents, teach your children about God's design and order for sexuality. Teach them how to avoid being victimized, and how to view others with God-given dignity and value.

STEWARDSHIP TALES

When it comes to giving hard earned money to the church, what basis is there from which to determine an acceptable contribution? Along with this question there is also the consideration of what standard should be used-the Jones', the church's, our own, or Gods? The concept of tithing is for the most part an act of adoration and thanksgiving. It is returning to God ten per cent of all one receives as an acknowledgement that God has dominion over everything. Often when the church asks for money, the reply is



"how much do you need?" This has nothing to do with needs of others, but with an individual's personal need to recognize God as a personal creator-seeing all things coming from Him.

It is a way of life whereby the person who tithes in good faith and places God first in his or her life and develops a sense of complete trust in Him. To look at tithing this way makes sense even to the poor, to those on relief, to dependents, to those who have no income or jobs. It is the responsibility of the church to be the steward of the tithe, to see that all of it is directed toward God's work here on earth. An acceptable contribution is more theological than financial or economic, in that it puts God first by returning the first ten per cent of our income. It is an act of faith and hope and love and gratitude and penance.

The intention and promise to tithe puts God first. The thither is happy to contribute God's money. They are left with the good feeling that they have made an acceptable sacrifice, not in the eyes of their neighbors, not the church, but in the eyes of God.

MISSION TEAM NEWS

LUTHERAN DISASTER RESPONSE

The SOTP Mission Team designated \$500 in October to go to Lutheran Disaster Response: **Ebola Outbreak Response.** This gift will be used 100% to assist those impacted by the Ebola crisis in Liberia, Sierra Leone and Guinea. General Fund Notes: Through September, operating revenues exceed expenses. Member contributions continue to exceed budget primarily due to Prepaid Pledges of \$15,480.00 from 2013 being recognized in January 2014. Expenses are over budget in the categories headed Facilities, and Office Expenses - Equipment Rental. Facilities Lawncare/Snow Removal is in excess of budget because of the number of snow events we have had this year and mulch expense not budgeted. Overall General Fund Income exceeds Expenses to Budget YTD \$10,193.50 and we appreciate the restraint staff and mission teams have shown in spending in the various expense categories.
