From The Word...

In the fifth chapter of the book of James, the “heart” is mentioned twice. The first mention is about the “heart” of the rich (v. 5). These are the people who have spent their lives focusing on themselves. Rather than

living justly and generously in relation to others, they have focused on laying up treasures for themselves. By living lives of luxurious self-indulgence, they have spent their time “fattening” their “hearts” . . . which is a lifestyle which leads to ruin. A few verses later (v. 8), James tells readers the secret to spiritual growth, endurance during suffering, and the steadfastness that leads to eternal life.

Specifically, he tells us to “establish” our hearts. The word he uses means “to strengthen, to make firm, and to render constant.” What is commanded is an active pursuit of and adherence to faith in the midst of life’s difficulties, temptations, and trials. In other words, we are to actively study God’s Word, pray, engage in regular fellowship with other believers, and pursue all avenues to spiritual growth. Life in today’s world is fast-paced and confusing. Not only does our culture issue challenges to us as parents, but it’s throwing all kinds of destructive messages at our kids. Who will we follow? Who will they follow? Parents, establish your hearts. Then, encourage and help your kids to do the same!

Trends Dirty Sprite

Recently, we've been encountering reports of a troubling drug abuse trend making its way around the country through the teen population. Teenagers are now experimenting with a drug cocktail that is made by mixing sprite, candy, and prescription medications including things like cough syrup with codeine, or crushed pain killer pills. In the teen population, this dangerous new mixture goes by names like Dirty Sprite, Lean, Purple Drank, and Sizzurp.

Behavioral Specialists in North Carolina have reported high usage rates, with almost a third of children screened having tried the mixture. Medical professionals warn that the side effects of drinking this cocktail include hallucinations, rage, psychosis, and even death. Because teenagers are developmentally at a place where they feel invincible and invulnerable, they are especially prone to try drugs, thinking nothing can happen to them. Parents, pray for your kids, and warn them about this dangerous trend.



Latest Research Brain Development and Impulse Control

Temple University Professor Dr. Laurence Steinberg has been researching the teenage brain for a long time. He recently released a new book, **Age of Opportunity**, to help us understand just what's going on in the teen brain. Steinberg says that when kids are around fifteen or sixteen years old, many brain cells in the prefrontal cortex die off while others are created. New connections form among these cells. As this happens, a variety of cognitive abilities, including advanced reasoning,

abstract thinking, and self-consciousness rapidly expand. But there are other connections in the brain that take a bit longer to develop. Specifically, these are the connections that control decision-making, impulse control, and emotional regulation. Steinberg's research points to the wonder, beauty, and complexity of God's design for our bodies. In addition, it reminds us that we need to be patient with our kids as they grow and develop. They may look like adults, but they're not.

QUICK STATS

- To raise a child born in 2013 to the age of 18, it will now cost a middle-income couple just over \$245,000. (U.S. Department of Agriculture)
- More than 4 out of 10 boys in middle school and high school tend to regularly exercise with the goal of increasing muscle mass. Almost 40% use protein supplements, and almost 6% admit to experimenting with steroids. (Pediatrics)

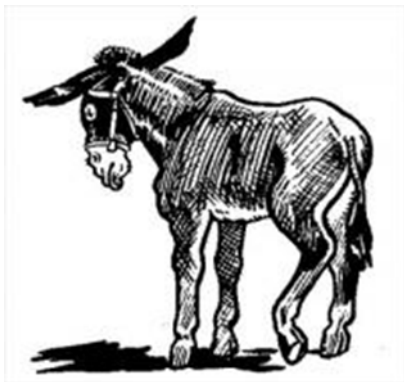

Family Meals and Cyberbullying

It's always a good thing when those things we know to be intuitively true are reinforced by research. And, with so many families skipping family dinners and eating on the run because of busy schedules, it's a good thing that research is now reinforcing our belief that there are benefits to sharing a family meal. Canadian researchers are saying that the social contact, support, and communication experienced during family meals are not only good for a teenager's mental health, but they help tackle the problem of cyber-bullying. Researchers have discovered a connection between shared family meals and a lower incidence of mental health issues in those teens who have been cyberbullied. God created the family as the place for a child to be born, loved, and nurtured. Love and nurture comes through time and effort. Are you eating together as a family on a regular basis? Doing so is an effective step at building the resilience your child needs to handle life's pressures.

STEWARDSHIP TALES

Too often we fail to understand that Christian instruction about money is one of the best opportunities we have to teach our children about God's love for us, and His ownership of all things. The way we use money is the extension of our personal characteristics. In a real sense, money embodies much of that which we are. By teaching our children the Christian use of money, by affording them control of money and the need to make decisions about money, we also confront them with the meaning of discipleship and Christian Stewardship. Perhaps the real significance of giving is what it does to the steward. What matters to God is not the gift, but the giver. Stewardship is God's invitation to a way of life. It helps us to overcome our selfishness and love of things. What we do with what we have been given is a sign to God and to the world of the depth and meaning our commitment.

General Fund Notes: Through October, operating revenues exceed expenses. Member contributions continue to exceed budget. Expenses are over budget in the categories headed Facilities, and Office Expenses - Equipment Rental and Web/Software Expenses. Facilities Lawncare/Snow Removal is in excess of budget because of the number of snow events we have had this fiscal year and mulch expense. Overall General Fund Income exceeds Expenses to Budget YTD \$9,363.38 prior to funding Provision Accounts. We appreciate the restraint staff and mission teams have shown in their spending in the various expense categories.
