


Mark your calendars for the next Congregational Meeting scheduled for May 11th at 7pm.

Ministry Musings

Ministry...what an amazing word! According to the dictionary, one of the meanings of the word ministry is, "a person or thing through which something is accomplished". To me that is an ideal way to describe how God brings his kingdom and will through us "on earth as it is in heaven".

Usually, I am on the giving side of ministry and concerned with what I can do to either help others myself, or to help enable others to do so. But this past month, as I have been going through recovery from my surgery, I have been blessed by the opportunity to be ministered to! So many of you have prayed, sent cards, visited, ran errands, given rides, brought plants, flowers, coffee, treats and even meals, called at just the right moment and performed so many other blessings that I don't have a way to say thank you for each and every way God has visited me through you. You are truly the model of ministry! My son brought me to church the Sunday after I came home from rehab and his first comment to me when we got into the car was, "Mom you are really loved by these people!". Your love and kindness came through to him loud and clear and was a witness of, "Caring for God's children of all ages by growing disciples who make disciples".

But God also ministered to me in many other ways during this time. A major way was the quiet time when he and I just communed together and no words were needed; I was able to simply, "Be still and know that he is God" (Ps. 46:10). There were the times of looking at my straight legs and being overwhelmed by and marveling at his healing handiwork. I saw in my mind how he had placed his hands over those of my surgeon, guiding the straightening of the bones and the placement of the new knees. Each time I walked into the therapy room at the rehab center, I was overcome with the sense of Jesus' presence and his hands working though the therapists as I and my fellow journeyers were encouraged to try to stand, to bend our legs, to move crippled hands, to take a first step on our own, to try the stairs.

In fact, thanks to a comment from Pastor Mark, I started calling the therapy room the "Pool of Bethesda" (John 5:2-9). The sense of the healing presence of Jesus was awesome and that room was truly a holy place, set apart for his life-giving ministry.







times, in an effort to instill self-esteem in our kids, even Christian parents set the table for a child to become a narcissist. Writer Elisabeth Broadbent encourages mothers to stop calling their daughter "princess." Broadbent shares a list of reasons we should stop the practice. Of course, one of those reasons is that we are creating a generation of entitled, spoiled brats. Parents, rather than feeding your kids' egos by calling them prince or princess, focus on helping them see their need to follow and

worship the King of Kings.

Indoor Tanning

Because we live in a world where identity hinges on appearance, our kids will endeavor to conform to the latest body image standards. As a result, many kids will compromise their futures by spending too much time outside in the sun, or even by getting a tan through the

> use of an indoor tanning bed. While melanoma accounts for less

than two percent of skin cancer, it is responsible for a large majority of skin cancer deaths, killing one person an hour. A new study has found that women and girls who used tanning beds during their teens and twenties have up to a six times greater risk of developing melanoma than their peers who did not tan indoors. Parents, you have been charged with the responsibility to care for and nurture your children and teens, this includes caring for their physical health. Teach them to steward their bodies to the glory of God by not tanning. If you have a teen who has tanned, be sure to have them regularly checked by a dermatologist.

Adding just one non-family passenger to a car with a teenage driver increases the rate of accidents by 44%.

FROM THE WORD...

Several years ago, David Bryant, director of Concerts of Prayer International and a leader in the prayer movement said, "The primary reason there is an acceleration of prayer [is that] we are becoming more and

And, we must seek and know the answers to their deep spiritual longing for God so that we can lead them into an understanding of what it means to find their identity in Jesus Christ alone. In addition, we must realize that our children grow in the wisdom and nurture of the Lord in spite of

"Do not be anxious about anything, but in everything, by prayer and petition, with thanksgiving, present your requests to God." Philippians 4:6 (NIV) us, not because of us. Sure, they learn a lot from the example we live and the words we speak, but the fact of the matter is that it is ultimately God who uses our meager efforts and gives faith to our kids, and then leads them to spiritual health.

Paul's words became more

and more real to me as I struggled to raise my kids through adolescence: "Do not be anxious about anything, but in everything, by prayer and petition, with thanksgiving, present your requests to God" (Phil.4:6, NIV). Prayer is God's gift to us as we depend on him and his power to keep us on track as moms and dads.
