A Note From Pastor Mark

Brothers and Sisters in Christ,

We have been using our summer months to do worship a little bit differently at Shepherd of the Prairie. Our themes have been related to some famous biblical characters and we have used our worship liturgy to lift up particulars themes related to these stories. We have also encouraged you to join us for a potluck gathering each month (next on July 10, 5-7 p.m.). A little extra fellowship and sharing is a good thing and hope you can join us in July.

One of my favorite stories in the Old Testament is Solomon. You remember the one who, when asked by God, what his heart's desire was answered. "Give me wisdom." Since we are not going to be hearing from Solomon in our weekend worship experiences, I thought I would use the newsletter to share a few thoughts related this great fellow in God's unfolding story of grace.

You remember Solomon, the son of David and Bathsheba, is not David's oldest son. But David chooses him to reign over the kingdom. As David nears death, his oldest son, Adonijah, jealously declares himself king. David overrides this and has Solomon installed as king while he's still alive.

Solomon finds himself in a role of caring for the people of God at a very young age. Can you imagine the thoughts that might be going through his head? "I am not my father; I love God, but how do I follow in my father's footsteps? Do I have the skills to do this work? Am I on my own?"

Each of us, at various times in our lives, have probably struggled with questions like Solomon's.

Sometimes these questions take on soulful lives of their own. Sometimes we, like Solomon, find answers in our dreams, when we are in a peaceful



state of mind and more able to hear and discern the message God intends for us. Solomon is given the opportunity to ask God for one thing.

Because Solomon has been consciously processing this new status in his life, he knows what he needs most. He already has wealth and status and power; what he lacks is the understanding of how to do what is right for him and his kingdom. In his deepest sleep, and with the guidance of the Holy Spirit, his need is for the wisdom to lead, and to know right from wrong.

This is what Solomon is known for at the beginning of his reign: making the right choices.

The Lord is pleased with Solomon's request, and grants it. God tells him that he will be known as the wisest man there ever was. And for a while, Solomon praises God with this gift.

However, the time comes when Solomon chooses a different path, becomes separated from God, and his kingdom is divided.

As we come to God, struggling in prayer, with thankfulness and in need, let us allow the Holy Spirit to guide our asking. God carries us through our daily lives; we do not have to walk on our own.

In Psalm 119, David asks God to "order his steps in the word" and to "make sure that his sins do not take over his life." With God's grace, we receive God's love; in God's word we recognize God's guidance; and in prayer we bring ourselves into constant relationship with God. Let's strive not only for wisdom, but to actually live out our lives wisely making good, God honoring choices in our walk of faith.

Mary. There are seven of them mentioned in the New Testament: Mary the mother of our Lord; Mary Magdalene; Mary the mother of James and Joses; Mary the wife of Cleophas; Mary the sister of Martha and Lazarus; Mary the mother of John Mark; and Mary the believer in the church at Rome. On Sunday, July 12, we'll be lifting up the second Mary, Mary Magdalene. Most of her appearances in the gospels center around the death and resurrection of Jesus. Luke, however, tells us that Mary of Magdala was one of several "women who had been cured of evil spirits." Mary Magdalene is then singled out as one "from whom seven demons had come out." Seven!

She's even been identified as the one who entered the house of Simon the Pharisee while Jesus was dining there, and washed his feet with her tears and dried them with her hair. "If Jesus were really a prophet," Simon the self-righteous thinks to himself, "he'd know what sort of woman is touching him--a sinner!"

Well, poor Simon. He missed the proverbial boat. And poor us who attach to Mary Magdalene unfounded rumors. But we have a chance to redeem Mary Magdalene and ourselves as we hear about Mary in Sunday's sermon, and then have an opportunity to reflect on her and her ministry. That will occur at our second summer congregation

potluck at 5:00 pm. Bring whatever you like-main dish, salad, vegetable, or dessert and join us for good food and conversation. We'll conclude by 7:00as we praise God for Mary of Magdala!

There is a popular Christian song called, "Do Something!", sung by Matthew West. In it, the singer bemoans the state of the world. He lists war, hunger, abuse, slavery, poverty etc. and shakes his fist at God saying, "God, why don't you DO something?". God replies, "I did, I created YOU!".

This song popped into my head recently as I was read in Mark 6 about the feeding of the 5000. In Mark's version, the disciples come to Jesus and tell

him to send the crowd away so they can go buy themselves something to eat. Jesus replies, "Why don't you give them something?". In Matthew's and Luke's accounts when the disciples request that he send them away Jesus replies, "They need not go away; you give them something to eat". In John 6 he asks Phillip, "Where can we buy bread to feed these people?". In each Gospel, just as in the song, Jesus tells his followers to take care of the problem. And when they bring their meager resources to him (seven loaves and two fish) he blesses it and multiplies it so that there is enough for all. **But still, he gives it to his disciples to distribute!**

I know I have often wondered why God doesn't just jump in and fix what's wrong with the world? Why do all these bad things happen, why are people hungry and homeless, hurt and abused? But just as then, Jesus' power wasn't meant to show he was a conjurer who could snap his fingers and wipe away all that was broken in the world; and neither is it now! Jesus' power was about God's kingdom moving into this broken world with the force of new creation! From that point this power would move forward through his church in all of creation through all of time.

And here we are now, God's church, his instrument of healing, feeding, caring for his people, his world and all of creation. Now as then this task of restoration means more than just sending our dollars to famine relief or lamenting the state of the world and the evils we hear on the news. It also means that those of us who discover the living God in and through Jesus must be willing to face up to the evil influences and powers that still operate and manage so much of God's world and to face up to them in the name and authority of Jesus.

How do we do that? For each of us the call from God to be his disciple is unique and we will need his strength to answer that individual call through prayer and faithful action to care for a world that still waits for God's kingdom to come and his will to be done on earth as it is in heaven.

The song I started with goes on to say in the Chorus; "If not us then who, if not me and you, right now, it's time for us to do something! If not now then when will we see an end to all this pain, it's not enough to do nothing! It's time for us to do something!"

BUILDING FUND- FORWARD IN FAITH - FORWARD One Fund - Two Campaigns

There seems to be some confusion regarding these three terms. Let's see if we can clarify these terms for you.

- <u>Building Fund</u> The Building Fund is a separate and distinct Fund within our accounting system that is restricted to paying expenses related to our building. In the past these expenses have been primarily mortgage payments and debt reduction. In the past members have been asked to make an annual Pledge to the Building Fund to support these costs.
- <u>Forward in Faith Campaign</u> In the summer of 2015 we began a new Capital Campaign which we named Forward in Faith (FIF). At that time, we were planning to build a new Multi-Purpose space. Members were asked to make a three-year Pledge to this campaign. The donations to FIF are deposited into the Building Fund and are used to pay the expenses associated with our building project. If you put an amount on the Building Fund line on your envelope it is treated as a Forward in Faith donation and is counted toward your Forward in Faith Pledge.
- FORWARD Campaign After hiring an architect and "visioning" our needs it was determined that what we really needed was a new sanctuary, more office space and more music/education space. Since the cost of this change in direction exceeds the anticipated amount we would have needed for a multipurpose room, it became necessary to ask everyone to consider making a special additional gift to bridge this gap.

This additional campaign has been named FORWARD and is being tracked separately from Forward in Faith. If you are making a donation to the FORWARD Campaign, or are fulfilling a Pledge that you have made to the FORWARD Campaign, be sure to mark FORWARD on the check or envelope so that we can track it separately from FIF donations. It is important that all FORWARD gifts be received in 2016. The decision on exactly what we build will have to be made in December 2016, and the cash on hand will determine what we can afford to build.



General Fund Notes: Through May operating income was more than expenses by \$26,137.56. Member contributions are over budget by \$18,737.28. Expenses are under budget \$7,415.28. Overall General Fund Income is more than Expenses to Budget YTD \$26,152.56 primarily due to unfunded Provision Accounts, prepaid pledges, controlled staff costs, and increased member contributions. We continue to encourage the restraint of staff and mission teams in their spending in the various expense categories.
