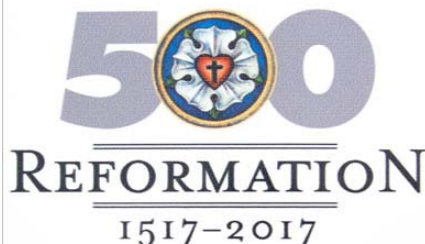

A Note From Pastor Mark

Brothers and Sisters in Christ,
Reformation 500 Beginning the
Celebration!!!

Does anybody know what the truth is
anymore?

We hear so many conflicting voices
and claims that it's hard to know which
are speaking truth. Especially, as this
election season ramps up, we are left
to ponder, what is true and what is
not.



Why is the truth so hard to admit?

A clue might be taken from Jesus' mentioning in scripture that we are slaves
to sin. It is the text for Reformation Sunday 2016, John 8:31-36.

Who wants to admit that? The Jewish followers of Jesus couldn't relate. They
protested that they were never slaves to anyone. They were children of
Abraham! Somehow their sin was invisible to them. Thus knowing the truth
about their condition was difficult, if not impossible.

The old tradition confession of sin (LBW) that many of us group up with has
us saying, "We confess we are in bondage to sin and cannot free ourselves."

The truth is we are slaves to sin and that isn't an easy thing to admit, nor is it
a good place to stay. But it is the first truth that is essential to recognize in
our spiritual life of following Jesus.

Slaves are trapped. Slaves never really belong. They never feel at home. "You
will know the truth, and the truth will make you free," Jesus says in John 8:32.

Once we admit, accept and own up to our failures, we discover a weight is
lifted off our shoulders. No longer are we spinning, dancing, and weaving
around the truth thus making things seem better than they are. Admitting
one's truth, one's real condition, is a first step toward following Jesus.

Jesus comes to make us free. Jesus comes because God the Father accepts us
in our most sinful nature and transforms us to be part of God's family.

Real disciples know God's grace. We become stewards of the truth that
Christ Jesus brings. This was the clarion call of the Reformation. I pray this
will be a year of celebrating what it mean to Christian, claiming our Lutheran
Heritage and recognizing what this means for our deaily life.

Martin Luther walked to the Castle Church in Wittenberg, Germany, and nailed his 95 Theses to the front door, the town bulletin board. This year on Reformation Sunday, October 30, we'll celebrate in fine style with a German dinner and a movie to boot! This will be the official kickoff for our year-long preparation as we move toward October 29, 2017, the 500th anniversary of the Reformation. The movie is the latest telling of Luther's story and it stars Joseph Fiennes. There will be pizza and another movie available for the kids. The cost is \$10 per person or \$25 for a family, regardless of how many folks you have! You do, however, need a ticket so that our caterer knows how many to prepare for.

In the meantime, our adult education classes continue on Sunday morning at 10:20, Wednesday morning at 11:00, and on Wednesday evening at 7:00. We're looking at how the Gospel of John was so influential in Luther's life. This Gospel shaped him as a person as well as his theology, his understanding of how God operates in the world. In fact, it's not too much to say that John's Gospel was part and parcel of Luther's own spiritual reformation. Come join us! It's not too late.

- RFQs have been sent to Acoustic Consultants, Audio Visual Consultants, and Landscape companies as well.

But did we mention....***THE BERM IS MOVING!!!!*** We have officially begun the construction process! Yes, we have had faith, but Finally this is something we, along with our neighbors can see! Yes, Excitement is....***BUILDING!*** And God's people say....***AMEN!***

WHAT IS PADS?

Public Action to Deliver Shelter (McHenry County founded 1988). This program is not government supported. Since 2009,



PADS reports a 51% increase in people needing help (33% increase in homeless individuals diagnosed with mental illness 54% increase in chronically homeless and 46% increase in transitional youth).

HOW DOES SOTP HELP?

We make lunches and serve dinner. Preferably five volunteers are needed. Youth volunteers are welcome (depending on maturity level and if they able to sit still for one hour following directions without adult supervision). We meet at SOTP Sunday evenings at 5:45 p.m. to make lunches for the shelter, and then transport lunches (including donations) to Bethany. We serve dinner from 7:00 to 8:00 p.m. Jill Brown shops for supplies. This is a ministry that is allocated in our church budget.

WHEN?

WHERE?

We support Bethany Lutheran Church every 4th Sunday at 76 W Crystal Lake Ave in Crystal Lake IL 60014. This is only a 15 to 20 minute commute from SOTP. Linda is our contact at Bethany--she has been in charge of that facility for over 25 years and will assign your job. There are 7 churches in McHenry County that provide overnight shelters (rotated Monday through Sunday) from 7:00 p.m. to 7:00 a.m. A transportation bus is used to commute the homeless between the churches.

REASONS TO VOLUNTEER

Add it to resumes or college applications. Earn high school credit. Give back to your community by setting a "Christ-Like" example.

VOLUNTEERING TIPS

Be friendly, but don't give personal information. Leave personal belongings at home (i.e.; don't wear expensive jewelry or don't bring a purse. Leave cell phones in your car at home or in your car.

OPERATION CHRISTMAS CHILD

It's not too early to think about Christmas! Once again, our SOTP youth will be leading us in Operation Christmas Child (OCC). Shoeboxes are filled with toys, hygiene items and school supplies, and sent to children in need around the world -- children living in countries torn apart by war, poverty or natural disaster, many in refugee camps. We hope SOTP members of all ages will help us fill many boxes of joy. Ways to help:



- * Pick up a red-and- green shoebox at the OCC display which will be in the Crossroads in early October. Or use a shoebox from home. OCC suggests starting with a WOW toy that will bring an immediate big smile. For more suggestions and the boy/girl tags, pick up a brochure at our OCC table or go to samaritanspurserg.org/occ. OCC requests that you include \$7 for shipping if you can. This can be a check inside the box or donated online with the receipt attached to the box.
- * Individual items and cash donations are also welcome. If you don't want to fill an entire shoebox, we'll have a box in the Crossroads where you can drop off individual items. Our church youth will use these to fill additional boxes at our packing party. Or you can make a cash donation before November 1, and our youth will do the shopping for you.
- * Bring your items or your filled box to SOTP by November 6th . What goes into the box is fun, but what comes out of it is eternal. Before distributing the boxes, OCC adds a gospel book in the child's native language, so the boxes truly are a way to demonstrate God's love. Often the children are also invited to attend a 12-week discipleship program. And it could all start with a shoebox full of love

Treasurer's Report - Operating Budget Year-to-Date as of August 31, 2016:

General Fund Notes: Through August operating income was more than expenses by \$39,705.33. Member contributions are over budget by \$24,737.04. Expenses are under budget \$14,992.29. Overall General Fund Income is more than Expenses to Budget YTD \$39,729.33 primarily due to unfunded Provision Accounts, prepaid pledges, controlled staff costs, and increased member contributions. We continue to encourage the restraint of staff and mission teams in their spending in the various expense categories.
