

## *A Note From Pastor Mark*

Brothers and Sisters in Christ,

We begin the month of November remembering all the blessed Saints. People in our lives who have been examples of Christ like living for us.

Those who have helped us become what and who we are today. All Saints weekend is a time of remembrance, but it is also a reminder of the work yet to be accomplished. We are called to bring the message of Jesus Christ, King of kings and Lord of lords to the world.



In chapter 20 of Luke's Gospel, Jesus is faced with a number of questions, all of which he answers in the language and frame of reference of those questioning him.

The questions are asked by the Sadducees, a group of wealthy, non-political Jews who followed only the teachings of Moses as listed in the first five chapters of the Hebrew Scriptures. Because Moses had never mentioned the resurrection, they did not believe in it. Further, they asked their question wanting to discredit Jesus, fearing that the number of people following Jesus would upset their Roman rulers and consequently the status quo and their affluent lifestyle.

Jesus answered their question, meeting them in the same manner as they questioned, in such a way that even the scribes were amazed at his ability. He went on to refute their belief that Moses did not believe in the resurrection by quoting Moses' reference to God being the God of Abraham, the God of Isaac and the God of Jacob, all who must be living, as God is the God of the living and not the dead. Here the Sadducees had the opportunity to listen to what Jesus was saying; instead they remained in their box, missing that opportunity to follow him. We wonder at their contrived and seemingly ridiculous question, yet, do we sometimes find ourselves asking and answering questions about death from our frame of reference?

Aren't many of our concerns about death and eternity only concerns because we see death and eternity from our perspective without trusting in God's power and wisdom and love? Is heaven going to be only an extension of our lives here on earth, or is it going to be entirely different, something far beyond our present understanding?

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Do these concerns form a stumbling block in our relationships with God— “Yes, God, I know that Jesus conquered death for me, BUT...”? We who follow Jesus know that the resurrection is real. We have evidence of that in Jesus’ resurrection (*Matthew 28:6, Mark 16:6, Luke 24:6-7, and John 20:9*) and as Paul’s faith declaration in 1 Corinthians 15:113-118. We want to live our lives in that confidence.

I pray you will join us to remember and give thanks for all the blessed saints as well as make commitments of God’s work yet to be accomplished through your hands and mine.

So many factors shaped the life and faith of Martin Luther. Certainly he was a man of his time, influenced by the culture and ethos of his day. He was a product of the 16th century and all that went along with being a man of the Middle Ages. Many of his thoughts and ideas seem so foreign to us today. He believed the earth to be the center of God's creation and opposed the ideas of Copernicus who thought the earth revolved around the sun. He believed, at least initially, that God was an angry judge, taking great pleasure in Luther's misery as a sinner and great delight in condemning Luther to death and hell. So much so, in fact, that Luther could say when told all he needed to do was love God, "Love God? I hate him!"

But then Luther's life took a giant turn. And as he went through his own personal reformation, he came to realize the immense love of God, even for one such as Brother Martin. Such insight into God's "proper work" as Luther called it, came from the Gospel of John and the letters of the apostle Paul. It's these letters, especially Paul's letters to the Romans and Galatians that made such a huge impact on Luther. And as a part of our Reformation 500 series, how these two letters influenced Luther will be our focus for adult education in November. You're invited to join us as we meet on **SUNDAY MORNINGS AT 10:20, ON WEDNESDAY MORNINGS AT 11:00 AND ON WEDNESDAY EVENINGS AT 7:00.** We'll gather weekly up to Thanksgiving and then take a hiatus until after the first of the year. ## *Ministry Musings*

Recently my daughter in law's grandmother, Nadia, died at the age of 97. Later that same evening my son filled me in on her story and I thought I would share it with you. She grew up as a young woman in a small town in Nazi Germany. My daughter in law's father was a boy during the war years and when the war ended he was a 14-year-old boy coming out of a Hitler youth camp, trying to make his way home across a war torn and divided Germany. One night, as he was trying to find something to eat, a young woman (Nadia) and her husband John found him on the streets of their town and asked him where he was going. When he told them he was heading for home clear across the country, they informed him that his portion of Germany was occupied by the Russians and he would most likely not be able to reach his home, but if he would like he could come home with them for a meal. All Heinz heard was "eat" so he gladly followed them home.



He stayed with them throughout his teen age years first working on a nearby farm and then at the paper company where John worked. In

1950 Nadia and her husband emigrated to the United States. Heinz tried to come as well but since he was of draftable age in the US, he was not granted travel papers. (The Germans and the Chinese had a strong hatred for one another and since the Korean War had just broken out, Germany would not let any of their young men come to America for fear they would end up in Korea and in the hands of the Chinese.) In 1957, after the end of the Korean War, Heinz and his young wife and little daughter came to the United States to start their new life.

Last year when my son and daughter in law took Nadia to a funeral they were astonished to hear that John (who died in 1995) and Nadia had been responsible for bringing hundreds of people from Germany to the United States to start new lives. Those refugees from war torn Germany were woven into the fabric of American life and now have children, grandchildren and even great grandchildren who are thankful for the life they have here and are contributing in mighty ways to make this country great.

At this funeral these children, grandchildren and great grandchildren came up to "Patin Nadia" (Godmother Nadia) and thanked her for what she and John had done and for the opportunity they had given to their families.

Sometimes we think that the little things we do are so unimportant and that as one or two people we cannot make a difference. Nadia's story can serve to illustrate how wrong that idea can be. An act of kindness can make a huge difference in the life of a person and for generations to come

Thank you tremendously for signing up and participating by using your hands to do God's work at the Northern Illinois Food Bank. It was an awesome experience sharing your fellowship and work with you!!! We also thank Sid Sorensen for starting this project and inspiring us to continue with it.

Thank you from the bottom of my heart. Some of the hymns we sang in church recently seemed to link with my emotions of thankfulness. Hymn number 774:

*"What a fellowship, what a joy divine,  
Leaning on the everlasting arms;  
What a blessedness, what a peace is mine,  
Leaning on the everlasting arms."*

Of course, it is referencing God's arms. Since we all were created in God's image, I believe God won't mind if I also include your arms in my thoughts. Your arms, your hands, your hearts, and your wonderful fellowship are all included in my emotions.

Without your participation, we would not have been able to help the Northern Illinois Food Bank's ability to feed so many of our hungry neighbors. Your accomplishments were amazing: 14,973 pounds of produce (potatoes and squash) were packed to contribute to 12,477 meals for hungry neighbors in northern Illinois; 1,657 pounds of creamed corn (cans labeled) will be added to 1,381 meals, also 5,558 pounds of cookies will be added to 4,631 meals. In addition, 4,300 bags were labeled and will be used for turkey gravy distribution to our hungry neighbors. Wow, you folks have been a true blessing from God.

Since it was so successful, we will arrange another event in spring, 2017. We sure hope you can help again. May God bless you with a wonderful day, and a wonderful life, Sharon and Dave Stangle

# Too much, too wrong, too soon

Last year, an article in the Washington Post used a bold-faced headline to pose this question: “Are parents ruining youth sports?” But the article’s headline didn’t end there. It continued by answering its own question: “Fewer kids play amid pressure.”



Let’s be honest with ourselves. We live in a parenting world that’s shifted from creating a home where kids can find sanctuary and solace from the pressures of growing up in the world, to a parenting world where all-too-often the greatest source of pressure is coming from the parents who set the climate in the home. Sadly, it’s not until we step back out of the fast-moving stream of our own parenting peer culture that our eyes may be opened to the fact that yes, we’ve gotten caught up in the rat race ourselves. In an effort to keep up with everyone else, we too put way too much pressure on our kids.

Over our years of listening to kids and tracking the research, it appears that there are three “hot-points” where we are expected and encouraged by our culture to put way too much pressure on our kids.

**FIRST, THERE’S THE ACADEMIC PRESSURE.** Nobody wants to have an average kid anymore. Consequently, the home, the school, and even kids themselves put tremendous pressure on kids to achieve high grades, climb the class-rank ladder, and get into “the right college.” Resume-building begins at the moment a child emerges from the womb, with parents pushing kids not to do their best, but to achieve above-and-beyond what’s reasonable based on their gifts and abilities. Sadly, we hear kids lamenting an “A” or a 97% as less than perfect, and disappointing to dad and mom.

**SECOND, THERE’S THE APPEARANCE PRESSURE.** We spend inordinate amounts of time, money, and anxiety in an effort to measure up to the unreasonable and not-even-remotely-realistic digitally-altered standards of beauty we’re being fed 24/7. There’s the clothing, the make-up, the hair care, the diet and exercise, and the plastic surgery. Yes, we’re called to care for and steward our God-given bodies. But we worship and idolize our physical selves. And when mom and dad fall prey to these temptations in their own lives, kids

will learn what's most important. Sadly, many parents send verbal messages that combine with society's pressure to reach standards that will never be attained.

**FINALLY, THERE'S THE ATHLETIC PRESSURE.** Have you ever stepped back from the sidelines to watch what's happening *outside* the white lines?!? Do your kids play on fields bordered by sidelines made up of screaming and yelling parents? Are those parents spewing pressures onto the field that push away the fun element that should be central to play? Are we teaching our kids that winning trumps character development? Are we, in fact, undermining the healthy growth and development of our kids on the altar of skills, scholarships, and victory? Are we living vicariously through our kids?

Thirty years ago developmental expert Dr. David Elkind sounded a warning that what kids need is a time to grow. They need to be kids who are buffered from pressure. Instead, what we give them is way too much pressure. Then, Elkind says, what results is stress and its aftermath. In the thirty years since, Elkind's words have played out way too many times.

Are you setting the table for your child to face pressures that could cause them to buckle under, fall apart, and even pursue idolatrous ends? Or are you nurturing them with love, mercy, and grace into a lifetime of pursuing God, His will, and His way, and His Way.

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### Why Youth Groups Matter

Teenagers need models and mentors. They need additional adults in their lives reinforcing the spiritual habits they're learning from you.

Teenagers need community. They benefit from friends who challenge them in all the right ways.

Teenagers need mission. The "activist" wiring of this generation makes them great Gospelsharers.

Teenagers need theology. Learning about their faith helps kids own it in a personal way.

Teenagers need a safe place to confess and confide. Accountability with friends often gives young people the courage to confess at home.

### VALUE YOUR KIDS



Chicago White Sox player Adam LaRoche recently retired from baseball following a disagreement with management about his son. Fourteen year old Drake had been attending games in the dugout and hanging out with his dad in the clubhouse. Prior to joining the White Sox, LaRoche had stipulated that his

son’s presence be allowed, but this year management asked him to dial that back. Rather than curtailing the time with Drake, LaRoche retired, walking away from \$13 million this season alone. “Of one thing I am certain,” LaRoche said in a statement. “We will regret not spending enough time with our kids, not the other way around. At every level of my career, the game of baseball has reinforced the importance of family to me. Being at my father’s side when he coached. Playing alongside my brothers as a kid and as an adult in the big leagues. Likewise, it has been great to have my son by my side to share in this experience as I played. In each and every instance, baseball has given me some of my life’s greatest memories. This was likely to be the last year of my career, and there’s no way I was going to spend it without my son.” Adults face many distractions that seem like necessities. Yet the only necessity is raising kids who know they’re loved and who love Jesus and others. Having the courage to make that your top priority is a sign of strong parenting.

### QUICK STATS
