Brothers and Sisters in Christ,

Deliverance...what does this word mean for you?

I suppose for most of us it is getting out of a tight spot or a bind of some kind or even surviving critical surgery.

Whatever, and more than likely, it wasn't by our own efforts either that saved us.

I can remember several times that a timely warning shout saved me from a potential bad block on the offensive line while playing football at Indiana State and another time a falling building truss while working on a Habitat for Humanity project.


I think that most of us can relate to similar situations when a 'call' set us free.

Have you heard God calling you? If so, what was your reaction? Did you answer or are you still pondering a suitable response?

If you haven't heard God calling you, how do you think you will respond when it happens?

Well, God knows your name and who you are so there is no getting around that.

Walking in darkness implies walking without God. Wouldn't you say that the very fact that you called out to God for whatever reason is God's way of calling you? If not, then why call to God at all? It's a two-way deal here.



You call, God will answer. God doesn't want you stumbling around in the dark, but rather wants the best for you in everything.

When Jesus called for his disciples, they dropped everything and followed him.

That takes a tremendous amount of faith and belief to drop whatever you are doing to follow a stranger. How many of us would leave home, family, friends, and a good job to follow this man?

## Ministry Musings



I recently read a book about simple words to use in our spiritual journey. The author sets out twelve words that, when practiced, can serve as a means to bring us into closer relationship to God. They made a great impression on me and I would like to share them with you over the course of this year.

The first word is HERE. Here is a simple word by which we show up. In school, at least when I was a kid, the teacher would

call roll and when she got to my name I would say, "here". By that simple word, I would make known my presence; that I was 'here', I had shown up and was ready for the day ahead.

Even before I read this book, I would often be in a specific place and time and think, "I am here, right now, in this place". The awareness of

my surroundings would sharpen and I would have a renewed sense of how I fit into those surroundings. As I write this I am here in this place (the church office).

Here at this time (on a cold wintry morning). Here at this stage of my life (semi-retired senior citizen).

Here in the midst of great sadness in our congregation (as we are planning a funeral). Here as gifts from the congregation are being sorted for our giving tree recipients.

But as wonderful as it is to experience my here, it is even more important to be aware that God is here, in this place, at this time. He has chosen to be here, to make his presence known to me here and now.

He is here on this cold morning, in this office, in my stage of life, in the middle of our sadness and our caring for others.

And God and I are here together; joined in a mystery that is God with us. His presence is the Presence that transcends and overflows all of my here-ness. God is here and we can become present to each in ways that cannot be explained or understood; especially in time of great sadness or fear. When I am here and God is here and we are here together, that peace that passes all understanding seems to come more closely.

One way I practice here-ness with God to find a quiet place and to simply be with God. To put aside all the things that distract me and tempt me to be elsewhere instead of here. When I practice being here in the quiet places with God it becomes easier to be awake to God's here-ness in the midst of a crowd and the crazy rush and crush that colors my life. I am more able to take a deep breath for a second and be aware that even in chaos, God and I are here together. Sometime I take in a deep breath with the words from Hebrews 13:5, "never will I leave you, never will I forsake you," and then breath out with the words from verse 6, "the Lord is my helper, whom shall I fear?".

I urge you as this new year begins to find ways to simply be here with yourself and here together with God.

- The plan is to have congregational vote to approve the construction loan in February
- Hopes of breaking ground in April or May

For the last several months, Don Schneider & Carol have been picking up a young man from Deer Path and bringing him to 9 am worship. There are times when they are out of town and we could use a few people to step in and bring this gentleman to worship. It would be best if the SOTP person that helps this resident was a male as he occasionally has toilet needs which might be uncomfortable for a female.

There are also other residents at Deer Path who may be interested in joining us in worship as well. **To bring them here** we will need people to volunteer for this exciting ministry.

There are a few requirements:

- A car that is fairly low to the ground as the residents would not be able to climb up into a high vehicle.
- A vehicle that is large enough to be able to fit the wheelchair of the resident.
- The ability to fold the chair and store it in your car.
- Their is help at Deer Path to be assist the resident in and out of the vehicle if necessary.

We would also need some people here at SOTP to assist in getting the residents in and out of the vehicle if necessary.



### **YOUTH CULTURE NEWS**

#### Communication - Walt Mueller, CPYU President

Communication with our teenagers is not always easy. The cultural and developmental differences between us sometimes makes it difficult to communicate effectively. The fact that some or maybe all family members are "wired up" to their hand-held devices adds an extra challenge. While we might be satisfied with blaming our poor communication on our teens, the burden falls on us as parents to improve our intergenerational communication.

Dr. Wayne Mack offers some very helpful communication advice in his book, Your Family God's Way. He lists



five "circuit jammers to family communication" that can clog the lines and weaken relationships:

Excessive negative talk. This takes place when we constantly complain, find fault, and seldom affirm or talk about the positive virtues of our kids. Excessive negative talkers rarely acknowledge the good things happening in the world, the church, or their family. These verbal purveyors of gloom and doom foster a depressing atmosphere in the home. Home becomes a place where heaviness, rather than happiness, prevails. Look for the positive, and talk about it!

Mind-reading speech. We throw a real monkey wrench into our communication with our kids when we assume and tell them what they really meant by what they said. If you've been the victim of someone who's told you, "You can't fool me. I know what you meant," you know how quickly communication breaks down. Just to be sure, ask clarifying questions so that you get at the heart of what they're trying to say.

Verbal manipulation. Because we're older and more experienced than our kids, it's often easy to enlist verbal attempts to control, manipulate, or punish our kids. Statements like "You'll be the death of me yet," "I wish you had never been born," and "You're just no good," destroy relationships. Think before you speak, and choose words that build up rather than tear down.

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Cotton candy speech. If cotton candy is the main component of your diet, watch out. Likewise, homes built on conversation that is superficial, lacking depth, and void of substance will weaken and starve. Relationships will be shallow where serious issues and deep concerns are never discussed. Look for and make opportunities to talk intentionally and deeply about God's Word, current events, and your teen's cares and concerns.

Knee-jerk speech. A quick, thoughtless response is usually an unwise response. Hastily spoken words are seldom profitable. Choose your words carefully by thinking before you speak. Maybe we should more regularly heed the words of Proverbs 18:13 – "He who answers before listening – that is his folly and shame."

Have a blessed time celebrating the birth of the Savior with your family. And, may your communication with your kids bring honor and glory to Him!

### PARENTAL SHAMING ON SOCIAL MEDIA

As our use of social media has become a bigger and bigger part of our lives, it's necessary for us to monitor how kids are using social media. In particular we want to keep them from posting in inappropriate ways. But recently, we've been learning that as parents, we need to be careful about using social media as a way to discipline or callout our kids. More and more parents are reacting by posting rants

about their kids' behavior. You might have seen videos of fathers smashing a child's cellphone, or mothers verbally berating a daughter for posting inappropriate photos. Parents, we believe that public shaming on social media is a dangerous practice. You see, shame is more about who our kids are, as opposed to what they have done. When our children fall into sin, it is best to address the behavior and issue discipline in the privacy of the home and relationship. Godly discipline addresses the root heart issues of behavior. Public shaming only fuels more rebellion.

## **Trends**

Adolescent hearing loss

Parents, one of our primary responsibilities is to lead our children from childhood through adolescence and into a healthy adulthood. Of course, we want them to be spiritually and emotionally healthy.

But we must also work to facilitate their physical health. Medical professionals are now sounding a warning regarding the possibilities of adolescent hearing loss as a result of growing up in an

ever-louder world. In particular, personal listening devices that are accessed through ear-buds have created an environment that is doing serious damage to hearing. Noise affects the ear through mechanical and metabolic damage to the sensory hair cells in the cochlea. The extent of noise damage is determined not only by how loud our kids are listening, but by how long they are exposed to loud noises. With ninety percent of adolescents using earphones, it's even more important that we educate them on safe use. and monitor that use. God's given them the gift of hearing. Let's protect it!

Latest Research

Health care professionals are still trying to sort out how to define and address the problem of Internet addiction. What researchers are certain of, is that young people who spend excessive amounts of



time on the Internet are more likely to suffer from mental health problems. These problems include anxiety, an inability to pay attention, depression, impulsiveness, lack of

judgement, and ADHD. The study was conducted at McMaster University in Canada and focused on college-aged young people. The researchers administered the Internet Addiction Test as well as another scale. Those who screened positive had significantly more trouble dealing with their day to day activities, including life at home, work, school, and in social settings. Parents, realize that technology is not an evil thing. But don't forget that technology can be used in destructive ways. It's your responsibility to set God-honoring borders and boundaries that keep your kids from Internet addiction.

- On average, teens reported getting 7.7 hours of sleep on school nights. The American Academy of Pediatrics recommends that teens get 8 to 10 hours of sleep each night. (Pediatrics)

General Fund Notes: Through November operating income was more than expenses by \$48,337.75. Member contributions are over budget by \$26,213.25. Expenses are under budget \$22,157.50. Overall General Fund Income is more than Expenses to Budget YTD \$48,370.75 primarily due to unfunded Provision Accounts, prepaid pledges, controlled staff costs, and increased member contributions. We continue to encourage the restraint of staff and mission teams in their spending in the various expense categories.
