Ministry Musings

HELP

Last month we explored the word sorry and how powerful that simple word can be in our life and the life of others. Help can have just as potent an effect on our lives and relationships.

When we are willing to turn to God for help we are bound more powerfully to him through our

needs and our vulnerabilities than we can ever be through our accomplishments. Our humanness wants to have us remind God, and anyone else who will listen, of how well we are doing; our abilities to handle whatever comes our way. But when we come to God and lay before him our struggles, mistakes, fears, hopes, dreams and needs we can connect with him in a deeper way than in our strengths. Remember the story of the Pharisee and the tax collector in Luke 18? Jesus says the one who came before God in his sin and despair is the one who was justified.

Petition is another way of saying help. Many of us are uncomfortable about praying for ourselves, but Jesus prayed for himself (Matt 26:9), and taught in the Lord's Prayer to pray for our daily bread, our forgiveness, our safety from temptation and evil. It's easier for many of us to ask for help for others; however, asking God for help for ourselves represents a move from self-reliance to God-reliance, and that is always a step in the right direction!

But in asking God for help for ourselves we need to be careful not to view God as our personal genie, the enactor of our will here on earth. Often our prayers of help for ourselves become a request for our will to be done and to make people or situations bend to our desires or needs. Someone is upset with us and we ask God to help them "get over it"; we're running late due to our own bad time usage and we ask God to make the lights green and find us a close parking space; we have a behavior that needs to be modified and we ask God to "take it away" or "fix it" so we don't have to put in the time, discipline and dependence on him to redirect our behavior.

When we cry to God for help and then leave it in his hands, we may get an answer we don't expect.

Several years ago, when my husband Russ was retiring he wanted to move to Dallas for the warmer weather. This move was something

that had been in our plans for years, but when the time got closer our daughter was expecting our first grandchild and I really didn't want to move. I remember crying out in despair to God for help, expecting him to change Russ' mind about moving; after all, that's what I wanted and was really asking for. But lo and behold, he changed my heart and mind so that I was OK with the move and the despair was lifted. Not the kind of help I wanted or expected, but later he showed me many reasons why he moved us there.

Anxiety is another cry for help. Life is tough! God doesn't promise us an easy life or a "get out of suffering free" card; even Jesus didn't get one of those. But much of our anxiety hovers around the "what ifs" in life! It tempts us to expect the worst, to inflate every risk into a potential disaster! "What if" I lose my job; "what if" the test shows cancer; "what if" my friend doesn't forgive me; "what if" I never find the right person or lose the one I have found? Anxiety and "what ifs" can be black holes that suck everything into itself!

But a prayer to God for help can give us the opportunity to reframe the situation into an occasion for growth. It's important that we name our fears, hurts and disappointments to God. Then we can ask for his help in bringing us out of the frantic zone and into connection with him where we can hold words like guidance, patience, mercy, courage, wisdom, peace, forgiveness, healing and calm before him as his grace flows over us. 2 Corinthians 12:1-10.


Once a year we put out our 'Quarters for Quilts' jar and July is will be out. Thanks to



THE PRAYING PARENT BY WALT MUELLER, CPYU PRESIDENT

With my own four children now out of their teenage years and into adulthood, I've had plenty of opportunity to think back on my own parenting journey. On the one hand, I'm grateful for the Godly advice that was given to me by older parents who had already raised their now adult children. All of the good advice I had chosen to follow paid great dividends. On the other hand, hindsight leaves me with some regrets. . . things I wish I had done differently as a dad.

One of my personal parenting regrets relates to prayer. Yes, we prayed for our children. But all too often those prayers were squeezed in between other activities on our busy and frantic schedules. Looking back, I also realize that our prayers were "amped up" in frequency and intensity when we were in the midst of navigating difficult parenting matters with our kids. I'm sure that's not unusual, but I do wish that the frequency and intensity of those "tough time" prayers was the usual rather than the from time-to-time.

Why not take some time to challenge yourself to pray regularly for your children in the same manner that Jesus prayed in the Garden of Gethsemene the night before His death. In Matthew 26:39 we read: "Going a little farther, he fell with his face to the ground and prayed, 'My Father, if it is possible, may this cup be taken from me. Yet not as I will, but as you will."

The great English preacher Charles Spurgeon wrote that there are five aspects to the way Jesus prayed in Matthew 26:39 that we would do well to emulate. How might enlisting each of these aspects change the way you pray for your children?

First, our prayer for our children should be lonely prayer. This does not mean that we are to feel alone as we parent our kids. Rather, we are to look regularly for opportunities to withdraw from all the regular activities, hurriedness, and distractions of life to focus solely on prayer. He was deliberately by himself where no ears but God's ears would hear his prayers. A lonely prayer is an intense and focused prayer.

Second, our prayer for our children should be humble prayer. When Jesus approached his Father in prayer he fell with his face to the ground. This was a position that represented humble recognition of his Father's power, sovereignty, and holiness. Sometimes we get lost in thinking that we know what to do and how to do it. Reality is, that if we depend solely on ourselves and not on God for guidance, direction, wisdom, and power, we are doomed to eventually fail. It's better to humbly fall flat on your face while crying out to God in prayer, than falling flat on your face through failure rooted in self-reliance.

Third, our prayer for our children should be filial prayer. The word "filial" signifies the affection, respect, and devotion from a son or daughter to a parent. Jesus assumed a filial posture as he approached his Heavenly Father. In the same way, those of us who have been adopted by God as His sons and daughters must "plead" our adoption, recognizing that God has given us the right and privilege to approach Him as His children.

Fourth, our prayer for our children should be persevering prayer. The Bible tells us that while he was in the Garden, he prayed three times. Prayer for our children should be regular and ongoing.

And fifth, our prayer for our children should be submissive prayer. If you're like me, your prayers are uttered while assuming that you know what the most desirable answer and outcome should be. But the prayer of Jesus reminds us that we must trust God's wisdom, as He will give us the answer we need. We must pray, "not my will, but Your will be done."

Perhaps you've only understood Easter as a time to celebrate new life. But Easter is much more than that. This year, make it an opportunity to learn new ways to pray.

STI Increase

The Centers for Disease Control and Prevention are reporting a spike in sexually transmitted infections among young people. Specifically, instances of chlamydia are up nearly six percent since 2014. Instances of gonorrhea are up

nearly 13%. Änd instances of syphilis are up nearly 19%. The CDC is also reporting that almost 20 million new cases of STIs occur every year, over half of them

afflicting people between the ages of fifteen and twenty-four. The CDC is also reporting that the reason for this sudden spike is that many young people are not wearing condoms. As Christians, we want to be about the task of leading our kids into a healthy experience of sexuality that gives honor and glory to God. Sex is a good gift from God that is to be enjoyed between one man and one woman, within the context of a committed marriage. We flourish spiritually, emotionally, relationally, and physically when we endeavor to find our sexual freedom within God's parameters.

Latest Research

Non-Concussive head injuries

Three million children are involved in tackle football programs here in the United States. You've no doubt heard about the growing concerns related to kids, football, and the impact of concussions on their brains both in the short and long-term. Now,

researchers at Wake Forest University are studying the impact of less-serious blows to the head and what they do to football players ages eight to thirteen. This is important research

as the brain is in the middle of a particularly vulnerable stage of change during this period of life. MRIs on test subjects indicate that there are some changes in the brain's white matter, which is the tissue that connects the gray matter of the brain. And the more exposure a boy has to head impacts, the greater the amount of change, even after only one season of playing youth football. While more research is needed to determine the long-term impact of non-concussive hits, parents are wise to consider the possible effects and safety of their sons.

Treasurer's Report as of March 31, 2017

First Quarter Report

God is good all the time! God has graciously blessed us with a combined contribution of \$301,423 for the General Fund and Building Fund for the first quarter. We are truly blessed and filled with the Holy Spirit in our giving.

<u>The first quarter shows us within the budget guidelines for 2017.</u> The Mission of Shepherd of the Prairie is proceeding on schedule as outlined in the Council Budget adopted by the Congregation. Through March operating income exceeded expenses by \$10,425. Contributions exceeded the budgeted amount by \$5,337 and expenses were under the budgeted amount by \$5,295.

As of March 31st the Building Fund Balance was \$736,758. During the month Building Fund income was \$35,924. This included donations of \$35,180 to the *Forward in Faith* campaign. Building Fund expenses for the month were \$10,674 and Year-to-Date expenses were \$84,757. After applying the monthly loan payment of \$5,273 the Loan Balance on our existing property is \$468,983.
