A Note From Pastor Mark

Brothers and Sisters in Christ,

It was the women who moved first to the normal tasks of tending to the body.

And it was the women who did not need very much convincing that Jesus truly did go to his Father.

They, too, listened at the feet of Jesus (although in the background). Maybe, rather than analyzing what they heard there, they discussed it with each other.



EASTER

Was it easier for them to believe the resurrection, and recognize it when it happened?

The men, we are told, were in hiding, probably afraid for their lives. They did not understand what had happened; they had been so hopeful!

Only Peter investigated the good news that the women brought to them. Peter, who probably learned to trust Jesus' word more easily after denying him three times, raced to see if all that Jesus told them had truly come to pass.

Peter helped the others rejoice in the resurrection – and understand that it was what they should have been looking for – because they were Easter people!

There was nothing to fear. They would be with Jesus in eternity, just as he promised.

Have you heard the expression, “every Sunday is Easter Sunday.” It is a reminder that we should take time, at least once a week to express our joy that the tomb is empty. We have hope!

Rejoice in the knowledge that we are Easter people! We live in the resurrection's promise every day. We don't have to wait for it. We can ask God to roll our stones away, and leave them at the foot of the cross.

We can look at the resurrected Jesus to lead us to an open and loving heart. Easter, is a celebration reminding us our sins have been washed away, and that our role is to reflect God's love. We are Easter people, Jesus Christ's resurrection was for you. We are called to race into the world to tell others of God's love with words and, more importantly, by our actions.

The new worship space is getting closer to being done! So exciting!! And daunting as well! We know that once we are worshipping in our new space, we will have many visitors coming to take a look at it. How do we make these visitors feel welcome and possibly see Shepherd of the Prairie as their worship home?

One way is to look out each week for someone you don't know and introduce yourself and your friends to them. I know we all like to visit with our friends and catch up on what the past week or weeks have been like, but put yourself in the place of a new visitor... you walk into the building and there are groups of people clustered together. You aren't sure of where to go or what to do. You get a bulletin from the usher and then stand off to the side, watching all of the conversation going on, but no one comes up to you to say hello; the best you get is a quick smile as they rush past. So you watch and file into worship with the rest of the people. As you sit in the pew and look around, the people sitting next to you are busy with their conversations and no one pays much attention to you or says hello. Worship begins, and you feel comfortable with it and enjoy the service. You attend communion and people did greet you with the sharing of the peace,

but still you feel on the outside looking in. The service ends and you walk out into the gathering space. They keep talking about the “crossroads” but you have no idea what that is. You stand in line and get a cup of coffee, but still no one has said hi, they just give you quick smiles. You see a big window with a sign that says, “Welcome Center”, but so many people are standing in the window area talking that you really can’t get near it. So you quickly finish your coffee and head out the door, unsure if you will be back again. One more visited church crossed off the list!

Or, maybe you walk into the building and a greeter says hi and welcome to worship. The friendly usher hands you a bulletin, introduces him or her self and mentions they don’t believe they have met you before. You take a moment to say this is your first visit and they again say welcome and invite someone standing nearby over and introduce you to them. They may move off to do their “job” but now the person you just met talks with you for a little bit and even introduces you to several of their friends. Now you are not standing alone, but in a small group of people and you don’t feel so “on the outside looking in”. It’s almost time for worship to begin so you go into the worship area and find a seat by yourself. Shortly a person comes and sits beside you and says, “I don’t believe I’ve met you. My name is _____”. You introduce yourself and they tell you they are glad you are there. You tell them this is your first visit at Shepherd of the Prairie and they make you feel glad you came.



Again you enjoy the worship service and at the end your new friend says, “Come on over to the Welcome Center, we have a gift for you”. They take you over and introduce you to the people at the Welcome Center window who invite you to fill out a card with your contact information and then they “mug” you. They also introduce you to some of their other friends who are also welcoming and seem genuinely happy you are there. You leave the building and walk to your car glad you came, thinking you just might come back again. Tuesday in the mail comes a postcard from that nice couple you met at the Welcome Center. The card thanks you for coming and hopes you’ll come again. On Friday you get a hand-written card from a lady at the church who thanks you for being in worship, gives you her cell phone number and email and says to let her know

if you have any questions. You are going back again! Each time you do, someone greets you and introduces you to friends of theirs and invites you to participate in the next activity with them. You feel so welcome that you invite your neighbor to come with you the next weekend. I've been the visitor in both scenarios; maybe you have too.

This is just a simple reminder that it only takes a few minutes to introduce yourself and say hi to someone you don't know. And it's OK to introduce yourself to someone and find out they are already members. You've just met someone new whether they are a visitor or not. Sometime even members can stand by themselves watching things going on and feel lonely.

We don't do things perfectly, but when we welcome another, we are welcoming them in the name of Jesus!

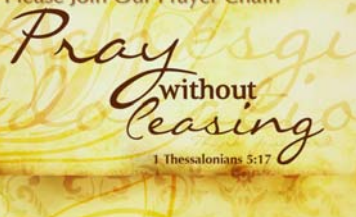
This will be an opportunity for you to learn more about the life and ministry of SOTP and for you to consider prayerfully whether or not you want to formally become a member of the SOTP family.

THE BARNABAS CAREGIVING PROGRAM

THE FIRST DUTY OF LOVE IS TO LISTEN - Paul Tillich



As you may know, the ELCA's Comprehensive Ministry Review Team spent a weekend with Shepherd of the Prairie last October. One of the recommendations they had for SOTP was that we begin a Barnabas Caregiving Ministry here. We are taking the first steps to make that happen and this can be an exciting step in ministry for SOTP.

WHAT IS THE BARNABAS CAREGIVING PROGRAM?

It is a simple, effective program for training volunteers to give care in most institutional and home situations. Giving care means having conversations with those who are homebound, in care facilities or facing some of life's most difficult seasons to provide a listening ear and encouragement to those who need to be heard and cared for.

WHAT IS A BARNABAS MINISTER AND WHAT DO THEY DO?

A Barnabas Minister is a skilled listener who encourages others by that listening. They are trained in how to listen effectively, how to build relational skills, and in how to encourage others. They will also be trained to bring Communion from the Assembly to the special person they visit.

THERE ARE SEVERAL WAYS TO SERVE AS A BARNABAS MINISTER:

- Caring for a loved one in your home
- Caring for a congregational member who is homebound
- Caring for a congregational member in a care facility
- Serving on a hospital visitation team
- Caring for a person dealing with a life issue

After attending the training, participants are eligible to be commissioned as Barnabas Ministers. After training, each trainee will be able to choose whether or not they wish to make a commitment to be a Barnabas Minister, and what form of service that will take.

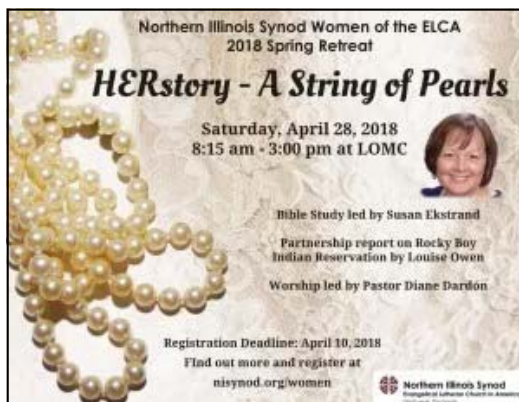

Preparing for Difficult Conversations

Budding romances and new relationships are all just part of the pressures a typical teenager will face with regards to their sexuality. Here are four thoughts to consider as you prepare to have difficult conversations around each of these and how best to communicate your values surrounding your son or daughter's choice to live with sexual integrity.

#1 - Communicate your value and communicate it often. I can't emphasize how important it is that your teenager knows what is important to you as a parent and why. Your voice has power... believe in it! If you want your teenager to wait to have sex, then tell them directly and give them a reason. Become the authority.

#2 - Listen and listen some more. Ask questions, check-in, and hear their thoughts. Also, take advantage of those opportunities where you get to overhear their friends sharing or even what you see on your teenager's Facebook, Twitter or Instagram accounts (sometimes those are the most telling) and follow up.

#3 - Respond out of love, not anger. If you end up hearing or being told something you don't approve of, remember that taking time to breathe, reflect, and seek discernment might give you (and them) the best opportunity to respond. Creating a safe place for your teenager to respond is important and can change what and how they share in the future.

#4 - Own your stuff. Sometimes the decisions your son or daughter makes can bring up your own past mistakes. Be sure you've forgiven yourself before you work through the mistakes your teenager might make.

Your teenagers will make mistakes. They will fall into sin. They will do

wrong. They will disappoint you. How should you respond? Christian counselor and parenting expert Dr. Paul Tripp offers some great advice in his helpful book *Age of Opportunity: A Biblical Guide to Parenting Teens*.

He reminds us that we need to demonstrate to our children “how the Bible interprets, explains, and organizes life.” Tripp writes, “Don’t resort to on-the-fly, ‘This is what I think about it’ or ‘Do it because I said so’ responses.” Your teenager needs confidence in Scripture as God’s source of wisdom and understanding about life. He needs to grow in his ability to use this amazingly sufficient resource.

Each circumstance also provides an opportunity to demonstrate how the Bible makes sense out of the things your child faces each day. The goal is that he would really embrace Scripture as a “lamp to my feet and light to my path” (Psalm 119:105).

**RIISING SUICIDE
RATES** There’s
sad news from the

realm of adolescent mental health. The U.S. Centers for Disease Control and Prevention are reporting that the suicide rates for adolescent boys and girls have been steadily rising since 2007. The suicide rate for girls ages fifteen to nineteen actually doubled between 2007 and 2015. Suicide among teen girls has reached its highest point in the last forty years. Among our fifteen to nineteen year old boys, the suicide rate increased thirty percent between 2007 and 2015. It is safe to say that teen suicides have reached epidemic proportions in today’s youth culture. The message for parents, youth workers, and teachers is clear: we must familiarize ourselves with the causes and signs of teen suicide. And, we must exercise diligence in building our relationships with the kids we know and love, so that they will not only know that someone cares for them, but that they will know they have someone to go to if they are struggling with depression.

Video Gaming as Varsity Sport

We've come a long way since the first video game was released for mainstream use. Do you know what that game was and when it

debuted? It was back in 1972 that the Atari corporation released the two-dimensional game known as Pong. For those of you who remember those days you can recall just how

amazing we all thought that original Pong game was. Fast forward 46 years and almost half of all U.S. households report owning a dedicated gaming console.

Additionally, 63% of households are home to at least one person who plays games at least three hours a week. With video gaming moving from coin-operated arcade games to the bedroom, you might not be surprised that our love for video games has resulted in some colleges making video gaming a varsity sport. Yes, that's really happening. While there is nothing wrong with video gaming, parents should be limiting gaming times and the types of games they allow their children to play.



Latest Research

Gen Z, LGBT and Atheism

Recent research from the Barna Group sheds light on some trends we need to be aware of regarding Generation Z, who are the 70 million kids born between 1999 and 2015.

Teenagers in Generation Z are at least twice as likely as American adults to identify as LGBT or as atheist. The folks at Barna correctly assert

that these realities post new ministry challenges for Christian parents, youth workers, and the Church. Among other things, this research affirms that our teenagers are in the process of exploring and adopting answers to two basic questions. First, "who am I?" This applies more and more to discovering how to embrace and live out their God-given gift of sexuality. And second, "what do I believe?" While there are many strategies we can employ to help our teens navigate these questions, one strategy is primary. From a young age, we must be educating and catechizing our kids into a deep understanding of the truths of God's word. Christian education is not optional.

- Teens and adults who stay up late on weeknights are more likely to gain weight over time than their peers that head to bed at an earlier hour. (*Sleep*)

- Participating in youth tackle football prior to age 12 doubled a player's risk of suffering from issues related to behavioral regulation, executive functions, and apathy. In addition, the risk of eventually suffering from clinical depression tripled. (*Boston University's Chronic Traumatic Encephalopathy Center*)

Treasurer's Report as of February 28, 2018

We move Forward in Faith and will meet the anticipated growth that occurs as a result of the New Sanctuary and additional Pastoral needs of our growing congregation. Praise the Lord!

Operating Income and Expenses are within the Annual Budget for Income and Expenses. Through the first two months contributions met expectations. The surplus for January was the transfer of \$26,250 of Prepaid Pledges received in December and February income was \$12,000 under the expected contributions.

Building Fund The Building Fund Balance is \$185,504 and we have used \$2,200,168 from the Construction Loan. Loan funds are used to pay construction and interest costs each month. During the month Forward in Faith donations totaled \$21,936 which is below the budgeted \$40,000 expected. Building Fund construction and interest expenses related to the new building were \$482,391 for the month.

Fixed Assets As construction progresses on the new building there is a significant increase in the value of the Fixed Asset for Building and Grounds which is now at \$5,138,621. The increase is \$2,193,135 higher than last year.
