YOUR BUILDING TEAM ANSWERS YOUR QUESTIONS!

Q: Why do we have ponds in our parking lot after a good rain? Shouldn't it be draining the water? I think I even saw a duck out there!

A: There are 2 drains to redirect the water after the torrential downpours we've had. But the drains are covered with landscape fabric, to prevent all of the rocks and sand from clogging up the pipes. When the parking lot is done, the fabric will be removed, and the ponds will be no more. Bye bye ducks...

Q: LOVE the new tables in the Gathering Room! Can we grab our coffee and bring it in to the new sanctuary?

A: PLEASE no coffee, drinks or food in the new sanctuary. Our new fabric covered pews, along with our new fabric covered chairs AND brand new organ can sustain damage from spills.

Q: How many people can our new sanctuary hold? How many did our old sanctuary hold?

A: Our current sanctuary held 225 people. Our new sanctuary will hold:
351 nave, 40 choir, 12 additional chairs + 130 overflow
Totaling 533 and more for seating

A Note From Pastor Mark

Brothers and Sisters in Christ,

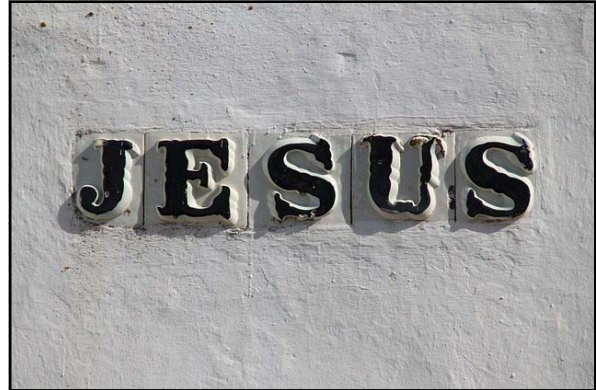
When Peter, James, and John witnessed the transfiguration and wanted to keep Moses (the law), Elijah (the prophets) and Jesus near to them, God said, "This is my beloved Son. Listen to him."

Only Jesus remained. The law and the prophets were fulfilled in him.

This is the same truth the Holy Spirit wants us to understand.

Take a moment and read Mark 9:7.

In 1 Corinthians 2:9-13, Paul was successful in establishing the church at Corinth when he preached "Christ crucified" as revealed to him by the Holy Spirit. The Old Testament prophecy has been fulfilled in the person of Jesus Christ.



In a little book I reread a few weeks ago entitled *The Christ of the Indian Road*, written in 1925 by E. Stanely Jones, a missionary to India, I once again was acquainted with an insight into how Christianity was brought to India.

Many missionaries for years afterward failed to recognize his prayerful and Spirit-led plea that they must bring the person of Jesus alone rather than the example of so called Christian nations in order to reach nonbelievers' hearts.

Do we as a church today bring Jesus to our community? Do our friends and colleagues see Jesus in us? Are we open to the Holy Spirit's revelation of all that Jesus is for our world today?

In thinking about where God is leading us as a community of faith, I found special motivation from Barclay's last sentences on these verses, "The nearer we live to Jesus, the better we will know him. The more we become like him, the more he will be able to tell us. To enjoy his revelation we must accept his mastery" (*Gospel of John* Volume 2, William Barclay, Westminster John Knox Press, pg. 196).

How exciting for us as believers to know that the Holy Spirit is waiting to reveal God's message through Christ to us!

What haven't we grasped that we can grasp today?

What have we gotten wrong that can be made right?

Ministry Musings

“As he approached Jericho, a blind man was sitting by the roadside begging. When he heard a crowd going by, he asked what was happening. They told him, “Jesus of Nazareth is passing by.” Then he shouted, “Jesus, Son of David, have mercy on me!” Those who were in front sternly ordered him to be quiet, but he shouted even more loudly. Jesus stood still and ordered the man to be brought to him; and when he came near, he asked him, “What do you want me to do for you?” He said, “Lord let me see again.” Jesus said to him, “Receive your sight; your faith has saved you.” Immediately he regained his sight and followed him, glorifying God; and all the people, when they saw it, praised God.” Luke 18:35-43 This has always been a favorite story of mine. This blind man sits not only at the edge of the city but also at the edge of society. At the time of Jesus, Jewish and most other societies thought that a person’s illness or affliction or poverty was God’s punishment for either their own or their parents sin. Those who were in front, leading the way, appear to be embarrassed by this blind beggar and try to shush him. But he wouldn’t be shushed! When he discerns that Jesus is at hand, he goes all out for this help that he needs and believes that this Jesus can provide.



I can’t help but think of those today who sit at the edge of our societies; the poor, the addicted, the homeless, the unemployed or underemployed, the mentally ill, the hungry, the lonely. They too cry out for God to have mercy on them; to cure their hurts and ills, to make life more live-able. Do we try to shush them as well? Are we embarrassed by their cries for help? Many times, we also tend to think that their situation is completely their fault. They need to ‘pull themselves up by their bootstraps’.

There are programs out there, why don’t they use them? Why don’t they just go out and get a job?

This story challenges us in several ways. One is for us to not overlook or shush the lost and downtrodden, the outspoken and annoying. The gospels tell us repeatedly that it is those who are in such dire circumstances that Jesus calls and saves. In this story it is not the successful and suave leader who wins Jesus’ gift of salvation (being made whole); it is the one whom we might be ignoring right now who is healed and glorifies God.

Another challenge here is the idea that those in front (of Jesus) were the ones who rebuked the blind beggar. True discipleship is lived out from a position not in front of Jesus but behind him. In the body of Christ, the church, there is only one Lord and leader, Jesus. Everyone else is a part of that body as a follower. Often, we get in the way when we try to rush out ahead of Jesus telling him of our plans and ideas hoping he will come alongside and bless them. For me I find that I am much more successful in discipleship when I stay behind and follow him.

Many we have a heart to follow Jesus and eyes to see those on the edges of society as he does.

MARRIAGE MATTERS



In her book *Love Thy Body*, Nancy Pearcey shares how one poll found that almost half of all millennials have given up the hope and perhaps

even the desire for a monogamous relationship. Pearcey writes, “The hookup culture is unraveling the social fabric. It produces isolated, alienated adults who come together temporarily for physiological release. By repeatedly breaking up or never connecting in the first place, many people fail to learn how to form the strong, resilient bonds needed to create happy, fulfilling, long term marriages and families.” Nancy Pearcey’s words remind us that the church and family must work together to communicate God’s good and gracious plan for marriage, sex, and sexuality. The future of marriage and marriages hangs in the balance.

Have you ever taken the time to ask your kids what they think about marriage? Chances are, they think about it quite a bit differently than you did when you were their age. Today’s young people are getting married later, and getting divorced more frequently. With cohabitation increasing at breakneck speed, a growing number of young people are opting out of marriage. Because of cultural negativity about marriage, bad examples, and experiencing the brokenness of their parents’ marriage, marriage is something many kids never consider. The boundaries regarding who can marry are changing as well, with conversations, debates, and legislation all addressing the growing reality of same-sex marriages. All in all, biblical marriage – as an institution – is in trouble.

Perhaps the negative old marriage clichés have stuck enough to serve as a deterrent. You remember these clichés don’t you? “Marriage is a great institution! But who wants to spend the rest of their life in an institution!?!” Or how about this one: “Marriage is a three ring circus: engagement ring, wedding ring, and suffering.” It’s time that we send our kids a different message about the meaning of marriage. No, there aren’t any perfect marriages. The coming together of one broken person with another broken person can be pretty difficult at times. All of us married folks know that far too well. That’s certainly a realistic marriage message that we need to communicate to our kids. And while we’re together, it will at times be

hard. It will be so hard, in fact, that there will be times when we feel like giving up. And, we will wonder about the decision we made to even get married in the first place. To make marriage work it takes work.

But even more important is our task to define just what marriage is. While God does indeed call some to the single life, He also said that it is not good for us to be alone. God made marriage and gave it to us as a gift. It's a good thing! God also defined the parameters for His gift of marriage. It's to be a life-long, covenantal, monogamous, exclusive heterosexual union between one man and one woman. Our kids need us to continually engage in show and tell when it comes to marriage. We need to tell them that marriage is not some kind of human invention. Instead, God made it for us and gave it to us. Whether you are a parent who's married, or single by choice or circumstance, you can and must talk to your kids about the goodness of God's design for marriage. Our culture never stops talking to our kids. about marriage. Neither should you.

IMPORTANCE OF CHORES *Tim Elmore, from Growing Leaders, recently shared the results of the Harvard Grant Study, which is the longest longitudinal study in history. Way back in 1929 to 1944, mentally healthy Harvard sophomores began being tracked in an effort to look for the patterns that foster happy and well-adjusted adults over the course of a lifetime. Several of the students are still alive and are being tracked even to this day. Elmore reports that some of the factors that lead to happiness and being well-adjusted include embracing a community of close friends, having warm and caring parents, and having a happy marriage. But the study also found a connection between being required to do chores as a child and success as a grown-up. And the earlier children start with chores, the better. Parents, we live in a day and age where parents are expected to cater to their children. Don't cave in to the temptation to do everything for them. Create a path to success by teaching them to work hard to the glory of God.*

Gambling

Parents, are you talking to your kids about gambling? A recent study published in the Journal of Gambling Studies found that young teens who gamble are at a greater risk of struggling in school. With sports gambling and gambling online readily available, the temptations to make a quick buck or two are very real for your impressionable children and teens. Teens who engage in gambling activities after school spend less time on their schoolwork. While negative outcomes like these should be cause for us to intervene and steer our kids away from gambling, there are deeper spiritual issues at work. In Matthew 6:21, Jesus tells us that where our treasure is, there will our hearts be also. When we come to believe that money is the passport to privilege and freedom from worry, we are engaging in the pursuit of a false redeemer and idolatry. In I Timothy 6:10, Paul tells us that money is the root of all evil. Good behavior should flow from a heart oriented towards obedience to God.



Latest Research

Rinstas and Finstas

Australian researcher Joanne Orlando has been tracking with teens on how they use social media. Her data shows that 76% of teens in the U.S. use Instagram regularly, accessing it about ten to thirty times a day. She's found that teens often have more than one Instagram account. They will have a "rinstagram" – or "rinsta" – which is their real instagram account. They will also have a "finstagram" or "finsta" that is a fake Instagram account. This practice is now becoming the norm for many teenagers. One of the reasons for using these fake accounts is to dodge the pressure to create and maintain the picture-perfect online profile. Using the fake account allows them to present a more raw and real personality to their smaller circle of close friends. While the practice encourages presentation of one's self in honest ways, the fact that they are secretive accounts means that kids might believe they are somehow protected and secure. Tell your kids that their digital footprint is there forever.

FINANCIAL NEWS

Treasurer's Report as of May 31, 2018

Operating Income and Expenses are within the Annual Budget for Income and Expenses through May. Contributions met expectations. The year-to-date total income of \$316,593 included the transfer of \$26,250 of Prepaid Pledges received in December. Income for April was \$61,096 which was \$2,268 above the budgeted amount for April. Expenses were \$54,998 for April and year-to-date expenses totaled \$254,579 which was \$31,391 below the budgeted amount.

Building Fund The Building Fund Balance is \$164,646 and Construction Loan funds were used to pay construction and interest costs monthly. During the month Forward in Faith donations totaled \$23,549 and year-to-date donations totaled \$185,680. Building Fund construction and interest expenses related to the new building were \$552,238 for the month.

Fixed Assets As construction progresses on the new building there is a significant increase in the value of the Fixed Asset for Building and Grounds which is now at \$6,987,884. The increase is \$3,886,503 higher than last year.
