A Note From Pastor Mark

Dear Sisters and Brothers in Christ.

During the season of Lent, beginning February 21, we are going to be using the

Psalm as our preaching texts for Sunday worship. We will be focusing on the Psalms and how we

might use the Bibles song book for prayer in our lives.

Have you experienced a time in your life when something dreadful was overcome and good news came to you when you were expecting the worst?

What was that like?

I remember a number of years ago visiting an elderly patient in the hospital who was in intensive care. When I arrived, the physician came to explain that she would need to stay longer in order to have a medical procedure done that would be guite difficult. I could see the struggle in her eyes as the doctor was explaining this to her. The doctor concluded that he would need to talk with another physician about the proposed procedure and would return. I sat with this woman as we thought about what the surgery would mean for her.

There was a feeling of uncertainty and dread surrounding her.

Within a few minutes the physician returned. He had a smile on his face. He had conferred with the other physician who determined that the procedure would not be necessary. Not only that, she should be allowed to be released from the hospital into the care of her family as soon as possible!

The smile that broke out on her face was enormous! What relief was felt! At that moment she could have risen up from her bed and danced. She was in the mood for celebration and worship.

The longer we live we collect more and more memories of life experiences, strugales, difficulties, and challenges.

How do we grieve? How do we express our sorrow when a loved one dies? How do we lament? Or even, do we? Some cultures lament very well. Others, not so much. For instance, in the Jewish tradition, people often "sit shiva", that is, they come and sit with the bereaved for up to 7 days. In Ireland people lament by "keening" which is an action of

loud wailing. Here in America, we more often than not adopt the British custom of "keeping a stiff upper lip." Admirable to some but not very healthy. During our Lenten Bible study this year, we'll spend time reflecting on how we lament. We'll look at the Psalms of Lament (there are a number of them). We'll explore the Hymns of Lament (there's a whole section in our hymnal). We'll open the book of Lamentation and see what help might be there. Lamenting, when our hearts are deeply sorrowful, is a strong Jewish/Christian tradition that's been passed down to us. It's an emotional and spiritual healthy thing to lament. HABITAT FOR HUMANITY

"Shepherd of the Prairie supports Habitat for Humanity in three different ways. One is financially, two is working at Habitat's Restore in Elgin, and three is actually participating in the construction and process of moving a family into the new home. Over the next few months I will be giving some insights as to the total picture of Habitat's efforts; from finding reliable home owners, to arranging loans and doing paperwork, to



monitoring the responsibilities of ownership, to physically helping with shopping for first time tools, food, and basic furnishings.

I'll try to provide greater details and insights in my next article, but thought I would start by highlighting Jessica Majia, a new Habitat recipient in Crystal Lake, Illinois. The following is an article by Tom Quinian of Habitat's Northern Fox Valley District.

There's a solution for everything — we just have to look for it. Where others see obstacles, Jessica Mejia sees opportunities, and this goal -oriented young woman won't let any problem stop her from securing a home for her 7-year-old daughter. Jessica, a 30-year-old single parent, has been on her own since she was a teenager. After working in various jobs (restaurants, hospitality and cosmetology), she's now employed as a personal loan specialist and is following a path to management. On the side, she works as an Uber driver and a hair stylist. Jessica and her daughter are excited to move to their new home in Crystal Lake built by Habitat for Humanity of NFV with the help of Thrivent Financial.

"My daughter has never had a room of her own, so this is our dream," Jessica said. "This home will give us stability and a sense of accomplishment." Jessica, who was raised in Carpentersville, has previous volunteer experience with Habitat for Humanity and PADS.

By working at the Habitat Restore in Elgin and at a couple of build sites, Jessica has added to her ever-growing skill set.

MEMORY GARDEN UPDATE

The application for a Special Use Permit was unanimously approved by the Planning Commission at the Village of Huntley on December 14th. We met with the Village Trustees on January 14th and received the final approval for the Special



Use Permit. In the meantime, we received our Certificate of Exemption from the State of Illinois Comptroller's office for the Memory Garden. Once we are ready to start construction, we can apply for the building permit. We have completed the rules and regulations regarding the Columbarium. The cost for each niche will be determined after we receive approval from the Congregation. We are planning to sell niches and Memory Bricks starting on February 1, 2021. The Memory Brick order forms will be on the web site, and printed forms will be available at the Church office. A copy of the niche contract will also be listed on the web site. 



Turing Point decided to just hand out the gift cards as the client came in and Grafton Food Pantry did it by families.


- \Rightarrow <u>**Turning Point</u>**: we collected 37 gift cards and a \$50.00 check donated by a private party.</u>

FINANCIAL NEWS

TREASURER'S REPORT AS OF DECEMBER 31, 2020

Our congregation was generous especially during this year of Covid-19. First I would like to thank Sue Wehnes for her over 15 years of service as Contribution Secretary; she has devoted many hours to ensuring that your donations and memorials are correctly accounted. I would like to thank our Accounting Administrator, Melanie Chesny for keeping our Financial Records accurate this year. In addition to the Covid-19, she has accurately accounted for the Paycheck Protection Program and the new Giving Plus (Credit Card) program.

Assets include \$95,000 from the SBA Paycheck Protection Program received on April 24, 2020. These funds are expected to be forgiven at the end of the program. This does not affect the year to date Operating Fund.

<u>General Fund Report</u> The General Fund Balance is \$196,796. Income for the month was \$63,638 and Expenses for the month were \$59,048.

Mortgage Service Fund Report The Mortgage Service Fund Balance is \$63,048. Income for the month was \$22,190. The monthly mortgage payment is \$19,536.
