Shepherd of the Prairie Lutheran Church Annual Congregational Meeting

January 30, 2022

(Virtual and In Person)

The annual congregational meeting was called to order by Council President, Mike Luecht, at noon on January 30, 2022.

The Quorum Committee determined that there was a quorum for the meeting to commence.

Pastor Mark Boster provided the opening prayer.

The minutes from January 31, 2021 were presented. Moved by Marlene Bohler. Seconded by Grant Jahr. Motion passed.

Reports from the Ministry Teams were presented. Ralph Wehnes moved to accept the reports. Seconded by Judy Symbal. The reports were approved.

Bob Mollis, Council Treasurer, presented the 2021 Financial Reports. He noted that 43% of total giving was provided through the electronic option. He thanked Linda Dungey, Giving Recording Secretary for her contributions and Melanie Chesny, Accounting Administrator. He recognized the members of the finance team: Devin Burg, Bill Nesta, Cliff Dungey, Sue Wehnes, John Throckmorton, Melanie Chesny (Accounting Administrator) and Bob Mollis (Finance Chair/Congregation Treasurer).

Bob McDuffy moved to approve the finance report. It was seconded by Carol Waxenburg. The motion was approved.

Greeting from Bishop Jeffrey Clements were extended via video. He announced that the Northern IL Synod, ELCA would be electing a new bishop at Synod Assembly at Augustana College this summer.

Pastor Mark Boster described our Purpose, Vision Statement and Strategic Directions.

Mike McCann, chair of the Call Committee for a second pastor provided an update. The committee included Jessica Panella, Ron Mudge, Darren Walloch, Jessica Buesing, and Pastor Bill Waxenburg. The Ministry Site Profile was compiled from the congregational input. The Council approved it at their January 17, 2022 meeting. It was submitted to the Northern Illinois Synod. The committee is planning to have candidate(s) presented during first quarter of 2022 and to install the new (second) pastor by the third quarter of this year.

Pastor Mark Boster thanked the staff at SOTP and recognized incoming staff members. He thanked Melanie Chesny and Brian Buesing for their services to SOTP. He introduced Jeff Moore, Contemporary Music Director, to SOTP.

- Time-bound: There needs to be a target date for completion, such as four months or one
 year

Share your discipleship goal with a trusted friend or with Pastor Ryan or myself. Someone who can be in prayer with you and for you as well as encourage you through the year.

May we continue to grow in the "knowledge of God in Jesus Christ and experience the multiplication of grace and peace." I am so grateful to be a partner with you in the ministry we share at Shepherd of the Prairie Lutheran Church, A Growing Church, for Growing People!!!!

Pastor Ryan's Report to the Congregation

As I began serving SOTP, I embarked on a process of deep learning. I wanted to learn the culture, dreams, and needs of all who are impacted by our ministries. I got to work learning the ins and outs of SOTP's Christian education programs and began developing relationships with the youth of our confirmation program and youth group. I had meetings with some of the parents and leaders in order to understand some of the history, struggles, and successes. I owe a huge thank you to Bob McDuffee for his work to create a smooth transition for me. A single line in an annual report is not enough to adequately share how much his ministry is appreciated.

2022 was largely about learning the systems and procedures within our ministries. As you might expect, each church functions differently than another, and my goal was to merge my experience and leadership style with the culture and needs of SOTP in a way that brings out the best in all of us.

If the focus of 2022 was to learn the rhythms, patterns, and workings of SOTP, 2023 is more about building more and deeper relationships with you all. I have gotten to know so many of you, and some of you well, but my goal for the year is to connect, personally, with more of you, especially all of the families who have children or youth in our education programs and youth group. I want to learn your hopes and dreams for your life in our congregation.

At our synod assembly last June, the Northern Illinois Synod elected a new bishop. During the election process, the final candidates all reflected on how the COVID-19 pandemic altered our church, as a whole, especially its impact on our ability to connect with one another. Each candidate emphasized how important it is for us as a synod, a partnership of congregations, to reconnect and rebuild community. We are all in ministry together and our impact on God's creation is so much more when we serve together. I have had the privilege of working with our new bishop, Stacie Fidlar, and can confidently say her ministry is focused on building up the community of congregations in northern Illinois.

In a similar vein, I was reading the classic, *The 7 Habits of Highly Effective People*. The fifth habit listed is that effective people build stronger relationships by truly understanding others. In order to truly build community within a family or church, we must make an effort to understand what is important to others, what life is like for them, and develop empathy.

COVID-19, no doubt, had a negative impact on our sense of community. I don't pretend to know the full impact felt at SOTP, but I am certain this congregation was not immune to the negative effects of the pandemic. The effects are, perhaps, most evident in our youth. As we enter this new calendar year, the leaders of our confirmation program have made fostering a sense of connectedness in our students our primary goal. We want them to feel as though they are a community of partners rather than a collection of individuals.

Likewise, as we work to build a closer community among our children and youth, I want to focus on the community of families at SOTP. My primary goal for 2023 is to create opportunities for the whole family to participate in social, educational, service, and worship events. I want to help create the kinds of opportunities and events that will nourish the faith lives of our families. In order to do that, I want to get to know our families more personally. I want to hear your vision and hope for the life you want to build within our worshipping community.

Thank you for a great second half of 2022, for making me and my family feel so welcome, and for your participation in the life of this amazing faith community! I look forward to chatting with you over coffee, lunch, or a cocktail.

Human Resource Report

An overview of 2022 accomplishments includes:

A review of 2021 employee performance was conducted as well as goal setting for the 2022 year. It was determined that the same process will be utilized in 2023 as well, which is currently underway.

Several key positions were successfully filled including our new Pastor, Director of Children and Family Ministry, Contemporary Music Director, Accounting Administrator and Organists.

An annual review of the Employee Handbook was conducted, and a new version published with a January 1, 2023 effective date.

The HR team participated in the Church audit process, taking recommendations and feedback into consideration for future enhancements.

Pay cycles were aligned to a biweekly process beginning in the 2023 year to simplify accounting procedures.

Our focus continued this past year to be a cohesive team that always recognizes its important role in the governance of the church. Each member of the council contributed strongly to the overall efforts of the council, and I am so grateful to Sarah Wolf, Joyce Shotick, Bob Mollis, Cheryl Adams, Kathy McGuine, Ellen Nissen, Christa Serpe, as well as Pastor Mark and Pastor Ryan.

Shepherd of the Prairie advanced in many ways in 2022. The council achieved its goals it set at the beginning of the year. First and foremost, the congregation's calling of Pastor Ryan Mackey occurred. Shepherd of the Prairie is better in so many ways because of Pastor Ryan joining us, we are blessed. Also, the council led the additional emphasis on music and worship with the hiring of Jeff Moore and by supporting and encouraging, with more resources, both the Traditional and Contemporary services. From our Community Outreach team and our Connections Ministry, to the streaming of our services, and to the wonderful growth and impact the Artist Series has had, our focus is to continue to be a church with open doors. Additional results of this can be seen most obviously by the increase in the number of groups that use our facilities for their gatherings.

I also want to recognize absolutely one of the greatest strengths of Shepherd of the Prairie and that is the powerful commitment to volunteerism and service that occurs from the members of our congregation. Whether it is ministry teams, serving in worship, being present for others, or numerous other examples, I am comfortable saying humbly that our congregation models the way when it comes to service to others.

As 2023 arrives, we now undertake our first full year with two pastors. We knew two years ago that when this year would occur, it would result in a unique time for the council to lead the church. We are set up for this time. As seen by the results from 2022, this congregation is capable of amazing things. The council is confident that 2023 can be another successful year. Finance Team

The Finance Team is responsible for overseeing the daily, monthly, and year-end financial activities of the Church. Our 2022 Team members were Devin Burg, Bill Nesta, Cliff Dungey, Dave Shotick (Accounting Administrator), Sue Wehnes, Bill Ball and Bob Mollis (Finance Chair/Congregation Treasurer).

Your Finance Team monitors all financial activities and meets monthly to review the Church's financial reports. We report monthly to the Church Council with our analysis of the Church's financial position as well as any financial recommendations we think appropriate. We are responsible for the preparation of the annual budget and the monitoring of our actual financial activities against that budget. Financial policy and procedure recommendations are submitted to the Church Council for approval to improve cost control and financial processes.

We are also responsible for managing the Church's Mortgage Service fund, maintaining adequate reserves for the maintenance of our building, periodically reviewing the insurance coverage and policies, reviewing contracts for services, being alert to compliance issues, and assisting with an audit of the Church's accounting records.

In 2022, total General Fund Member Contributions increased by \$142,440 compared to 2021. The total General Fund contributions were \$913,174 compared to a budget projection of \$818,283. This income increase helped to offset the expansion of Spiritual Staffing in 2022. The 2022 General Fund expenses were \$842,094 against a proposed 2022 General Fund budget of \$818,283. This leaves a positive year to date balance of \$71,080 in the General Fund to carry forward to 2023.

You will find our 2022 financial reports and 2023 budget enclosed elsewhere in this annual report.

Other specific financial team accomplishments during 2022 included: Assisting with the completion of the 2021 Financial Policy and Process Audit. Review the Staff/Corporate Credit card policy with Heartland Bank. Review and renewal of our Mission Investment Fund Mortgage note for another five years at a lower monthly payment rate. Incorporate the SOTP sponsored BSA Troop 200 financial reports into the overall church's financial reports. Collaborated with the Facilities team to approve the HVAC agreement for the Sanctuary, the West Parking Lot repair and resurfacing project, and various Landscaping improvement projects. Created an updated Financial and Accounting Business Guide for 2023. Created an interest-bearing investment strategy using a Fidelity Brokerage account and building a one-year Certificate of Deposit ladder with all current investment assets being FDIC insured. Incorporating Audit team's recommended increases into several insurance coverage limits (Dishonesty Bond, Sexual Misconduct, and Umbrella coverage). Updated insurance coverage and fixed assets for new Storage Garage and Memorial Garden Columbarium with Insurance carrier.

Please join the Finance team in thanking Linda Dungey for her dedication, service, and knowledge in her role as the Financial Contribution Secretary. Linda volunteers her time to record all members estimate of giving records and donations. She also generates the members quarterly giving statements and annual giving reports. Please reach out to Linda and thank her for her dedication and service.

I would also like to thank our Accounting Administrator, Dave Shotick for keeping our financial records accurate during the year. They both have made my job as Treasurer very straight forward and easy.



Connections Ministry

The Connections Ministry includes Barnabas Caregiving Ministry, Small Groups and 7s Discipleship Groups, New Member Gatherings and Visitor Awareness, and Ministry Teams.

BARNABAS CAREGIVING MINISTRY

The Barnabas Caregiving ministry provides care in the form of encouragement and Holy Communion for members who are residents of Care Facilities or living at home and unable to attend worship. Members are trained in ways to listen and encourage.

SMALL GROUPS, 7s DISCIPLESHIP GROUPS

We have completed our first year of 7s Groups and are well into our second. We have currently five 7s Groups meeting with three taking a hiatus this winter due to weather concerns. Over the past year we have considered several topics in our studies; the video series, The Chosen, a study on anxiety, one on how to get back to a focus on living like Jesus, basics of Lutheran belief, making disciples and Christian parenting. We have had approximately 80 people involved in our 7s groups over the past year.

Our 7s groups meet together for a 7-week block of time, one in the fall, one during the winter and one right after Easter. Each of our 7-week blocks starts with a Kickoff



Celebration. The groups meet either at SOTP or in members' homes. They include, as they meet, the elements of study (Bible study and worship), fellowship time (fun and snacks), support, (listening to and praying for each other), service (finding a service project to participate in) and discipleship (apprenticing themselves to Jesus to learn how he lived and how they can too.)

NEW MEMBER GATHERINGS AND VISITOR AWARENESS

Four New Member Gatherings were held during 2022; February, May, August and November and we welcomed 62 new members to Shepherd of the Prairie. Many of our new members have engaged in ministry here at SOTP though Ministry Teams and small groups. Welcome to all of our new members!



We continue to welcome visitors through our Welcome Center and via our Visitor Contact link on our website. We have many visitors who worship with us regularly via our Live Stream and Facebook Live. We are working on new ways to connect with our visitors and to check in with our new members to continue to invite them into the life of SOTP.

Community Outreach Ministry

The Community Outreach ministry promotes Shepherd of the Prairie Lutheran Church to our growing community and organizes our church's participation in community events, helping the congregation deliver the message of salvation through Jesus Christ. This team also supports the Welcome Center outside the sanctuary. The Community Outreach Team encourages all members to invite friends and family to worship at Shepherd of the Prairie Lutheran Church.

In March we participated in the **Home Business and Wellness** expo. Mike Yndestad dropped off some materials and string bags with SOTP branding and placed them on the Chamber of Commerce table with their approval. During Lent we sponsored a Christ Walk program led by Rachael Yndestad on Thursdays at 5:30PM including one Saturday walk at the Park District. The walks included a devotional.

In May we organized a Teacher Appreciation celebration. Wendy Ottens met with Roshaunda, principal of Chesic School to organize this event. Bob and Caroline Malm purchased cupcakes for the teachers. Pastor Mark helped to deliver the cupcakes along with SOTP pens. This event was publicized in the newspaper. In April we started planning for the Memorial Day Parade with the help of Director of Contemporary Worship, Jeff Moore. We had people sign up through Planning Center. The youth group helped design the decorations for our float. During the Memorial Day parade we handed out frisbees along the parade route as our praise band performed live on our trailer float. Retired Colonel Cliff Dungey drove the truck that pulled our float and our members along with the praise band wore God's Work, Our Hands Shirts. Our church took First Place in the parade awarded by the Huntley Chamber of Commerce.

Throughout the year this ministry supported other SOTP ministries that were organizing community events. For example, the Artist Series was supported by the Community Outreach team even though it has its own organizational committee. Paddy, the Irish Entertainer, Jim Gill, Monroe Crossing, and 12 Dames of Christmas Artist Series concerts were all great community events. We helped promote the events through press releases and staffed the Welcome Center during the events. We also supported the church Picnic on August 21. We ordered corn on the cob to be served at the picnic this year. We ordered 100 ears of corn this year which seemed to be just about the right amount.

In September we participated in Fall Fest, held at Diecke Park. We hosted our booth on the 24th and 25th of September, in 2 hour shifts. Hosts greeted people and handed out Shepherd of the Prairie branded giveaways and information on our church activities. We handed out vegetables grown at the A.R.R.K.K. Garden, flyers with upcoming events, candy, pens, chip clips, frisbees, license plate holders, ice Scrapers, and T-shirts. We also had connection cards and trifolds with our church information on them. Fall Fest support was a success! We were supported by Matt Morrison in the sign-up for the event. We were well staffed by our members as well as the A.R.R.K.K. Garden ministry folks who hosted our booth. In September we welcomed two new members to our team: Annette Kaye and Sandy Johnson.

Throughout the year we supported four major food drives for the Grafton Food Pantry, working alongside other groups and ministries at the church. The Boy Scouts (Troop 200) were the most supportive group of the food drives outside of our church membership. We combined efforts with the Children and Family Ministry to sponsor a Trunk or Treat event on October 29th. The next Community Outreach sponsored food drive for the Grafton Food Pantry will be held in the month of February.

Our Community Outreach team also manages the welcome center located right outside of our sanctuary. We are happy to report that we are doing better with staffing the welcome center with volunteers for worship services and special events. All new visitors to our church receive a coffee mug filled with candy when they come to visit our welcome center. We are now using Planning Center for our support scheduling. The Pastors have been encouraging folks to visit the Welcome Center after worship services.

Community Outreach Ministry (cont)

We have new red name tags for the people supporting the welcome center. People interested in new membership are reporting to us that they typically watch our online service for a couple weeks before coming in for a visit. Starting this year we are now displaying slides inviting people to stop by the welcome center. These slides are above the welcome center exclusively, to help people find the welcome center more quickly.

Public Relations - We promoted our Prayer Shawl Ministry along with other ministry activities on the PATCH.

We promoted our children and family ministry with a special report on going back to school and having the children get a blessed backpack for the year. We also promoted the arrival of Pastor Ryan. Here at Shepherd Of The Prairie it is very important for us to have a relationship with our community and that is what our Community Outreach team is all about. We organized an Ad featuring our Christmas service times and we purchased ad space in the Northwest Herald to promote our Christmas services this year. Throughout the year we helped to created and distributed Articles, Press Releases, Advertisements and we are looking to do more advertising at Dell Webb next year.

Promotional Items - We have purchased both string bags and coffee mugs with our new branding on them. Both items have been delivered. The need for a new branded banner, Canopy, and table cloths for events was discussed at the last Ministry Night meaning, Mike Yndestad recommended Northstar for these items.

This ministry is currently in need of more planners, event hosts, and volunteers to support events that SOTP participates in with the Huntley community. Please consider joining this important community ministry. Mike Yndestad announced that he would be rolling off Community Outreach Leadership in February of 2023. Mike has led this ministry for the last 10 years and now needs to focus on his staff position as AV Coordinator. The tentative plan is to break up the management of Shepherd Of The Prerie Community Outreach tasks into three sections: Community Events, Welcome Center, and Public Relations. The structure and management of each of these sections will be further identified in January 2023. Community Outreach, traditions, highlights, and best practices were discussed at the Ministry Night meeting. Mike Yndestad encouraged the team to retain the services of Patricia M. Szpekowski, APR of PR Strategies & Communications, Inc. as SOTP's publicist.

Honoring community support occupations was also discussed. The team reviewed, honoring nurses, first responders, and teachers in the past. Annette Kaye recommended that we honor public works professionals in Huntley next year. The team also reviewed opportunities to partner with other ministry groups for community events.


This group works to decorate the church for the liturgical seasons. Banners and displays change with each season. Flowers are also designed for each season as well. Advent and Christmas are a remarkable

Barnabas Caregiving Ministry

The Barnabas Caregiving Ministry involves several service roles:

Barnabas Ministers; these are people who are trained in ways to listen and encourage those who are homebound or live in care facilities. The Barnabas Ministers strive to visit their care-receivers monthly and bring communion. They spend time listening and being a friend to their care receiver. Some of our ministers provide care through phone calls and by sending cards monthly. Each care receiver on our list receives two cards each month. We also have a Resource Person who can refer people to agencies where they can receive help in different situations. We currently have 57 people on our list who are either shut-ins or semi-shut-in. We held a training session in March of 2022 and we now have 35 Barnabas Ministers.

We also took on the joy of hosting worship services in three of our local care facilities. On the first Sunday of the month, two of our ministers go to Clarendale of Algonquin to worship with the residents there via our live-stream 9AM service and we bring communion to them at the service. Then, on the third Thursday of the month we bring a full service including communion to the residents at Clarendale, Heritage Woods, and Alden Rehab facility, sometimes with musical accompaniment.

Under the Barnabas Caregiving umbrella falls Grief Ministry, Caring Callers, Caring Cards, the Prayer Chain and Helping Hands. Our email prayer chain has 89 members. Helping Hands is once again providing Funeral Luncheons for those who request it. Our Grief Journey Group meets on Tuesday mornings at 10 and we held a Blue Christmas service on December 7th.

Caring Callers

My group of four women including myself continue to make calls to those in need of a caring caller! I contact Michelle each Friday for list of names of those who may need a caring call!My group of women are devoted to making these calls each week and we pray with them if requested or just listen to what they may be going through! I work with amazing ladies who are so dedicated to this calling. Thank you, ladies, for your continued help
